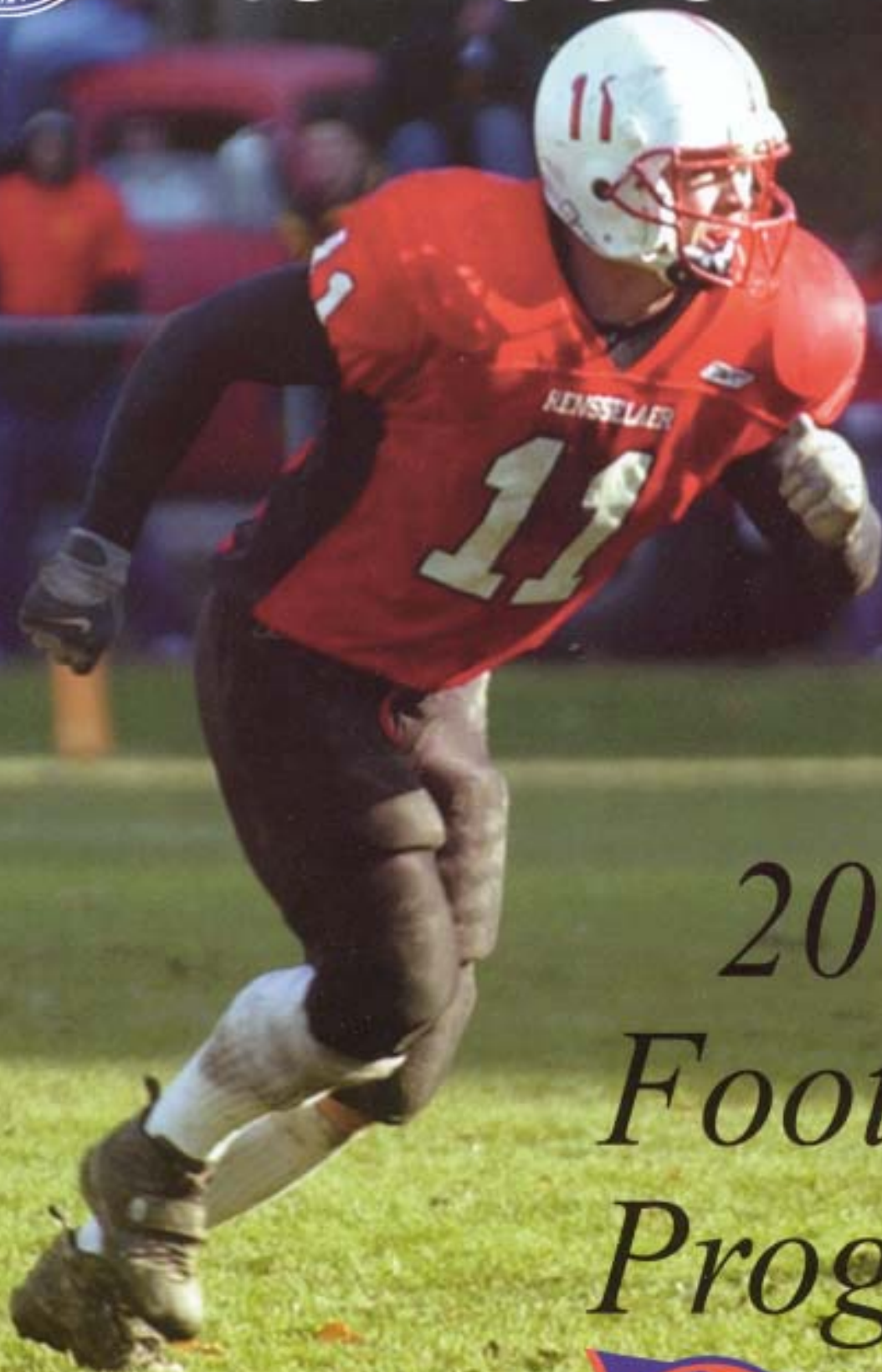

Prior to the final game of the 2004 season, the Rensselaer football Class of 2005 was asked to reflect on the following question: What has made your time at RPI special? Throughout the pages of this year's program are their responses.

WHY RENSSELAER?

• **You want to be challenged.** Right now at Rensselaer, there are smart people learning and researching. Pushing their limits. Breaking new ground. Working hard. Playing hard. Loving every minute of it. These are not your run-of-the-mill students taking ho-hum classes to grab a me-too degree. These are Rensselaer students. Ambitious. Original. Fun. And innovative – renowned as hands-on, “Can do!”, problem solvers.

• **There’s something here for everyone.** Make friends. Explore your interests. Blow off steam. Get involved. Rensselaer has more than 150 clubs, sports and organizations from which to choose – everything you’ll find at most universities, and quite a few clubs you may not see anywhere else. Dr. Shirley Ann Jackson is President of Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. She is immediate past President of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (2004) and chairman of the AAAS Board of Directors, a member of the National Academy of Engineering (NAE), and the Council on Foreign Relations, a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the American Physical Society, the Smithsonian Institution, and serves on the New York Stock Exchange Board of Directors. She is the former Chairman of the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC).

THE ATHLETIC ADMINISTRATION

KEN RALPH *Director of Athletics*



Ken Ralph was named director of athletics at Rensselaer on May 30, 2002.

At RPI, Ralph oversees the Institute's 23 NCAA intercollegiate varsity teams - 11 of which are women's - and numerous junior varsity squads, involving more than 600 student-athletes.

"Ken Ralph's enthusiasm, team-building skills and passion for creating a 'whole' student-athlete are the right mix for Rensselaer's athletic programs," Rensselaer President Dr. Shirley Ann Jackson said upon Ralph's introduction. "A critical part of the Rensselaer Plan is to create a vibrant campus community and athletics is a cornerstone of the student experience. I look forward to working with Ken to take our entire athletic program to new heights."

In his three years since joining the Institute, Ralph has worked tirelessly for the betterment of the student-athletes and the university.

In 2003-04, Rensselaer was represented at eight national events, including an NCAA Playoff Tournament Semi-Final appearance by the

football team - the first in school history - and an NCAA Regional Tournament berth by the baseball team. Individually, RPI sent 14 representatives to national competitions, including one who became the school's first-ever National Champion in swimming, as well as four others who finished in the top four in the nation in their respective events. Overall, Rensselaer had 18 student-athletes combine for 29 National All-American honors.

Academically, RPI had a tremen-

dous year as 19 student-athletes were named to CoSIDA All-District I Teams while an NCAA Division III best eight were selected CoSIDA National Academic All-Americans. In fact, Rensselaer ranked second in the entire nation in Academic All-Americans across all NCAA divisions, trailing only the University of Nebraska and tying Rice University. Since the fall of 2000, Rensselaer has had 32 National Academic All-Americans, including nine during Ralph's first year and seven this past academic year, to rank among the leaders in the country in all divisions.

The 2004-05 season saw RPI produced 11 National All-Americans, seven National Academic All-Americans and nearly 200 student-athletes were named Academic All-League. In addition, the student-athlete's average grade point average ranked higher than that of the general student body for the sixth and seventh straight semesters, respectively.

Ralph's numerous other accomplishments since being hired include playing an integral role in the passing of NCAA Amendment 65-1, which maintained athletic scholarships for a select number of Division III Institutions, including RPI and its Division I men's hockey team and the elevation of the women's ice hockey program from Division III to Division I. He also initiated the Annual Black Friday men's hockey game, started the Hockey Ring of Honor and organized the 50th Anniversary Reunion and Celebration Weekend to commemorate the school's 1954 National Championship men's hockey team as well as the 20th Anniversary Celebration

of the 1985 men's hockey national championship team. Ralph also oversaw the resurfacing of the Ned Harkness Track & Field and has served on committees with the Liberty League as well as the ECACHL.

Prior to joining Rensselaer, Ralph was senior assistant athletic director at Connecticut College in New London, Conn., where he oversaw a 26-team Division III department and directed The Lott Natatorium. Ralph headed athletic program development, was the NCAA compliance officer and supervised the coaching staff and the sports information office. He also served as a member of the Athletic Director's Advisory Committee and the Athletic Management Committee. He also secured a gift of \$500,000 to renovate the college's natatorium, then called The Gordon Center. The gift covered overall improvements to the facility and a substantial endowment for future maintenance.

In addition, Ralph served as head swim coach of both the men's and women's programs, compiling a 50-33 record (101-72-1 in his coaching career). During his tenure, which began in 1998, every one of his teams earned National All-Academic status from the College Swim Coaches Association of America, maintaining a team average grade point average of 3.41. Ralph, who also coached water polo, earned the 2000 Andrew Chait Award for outstanding service to Connecticut College and its athletic department.

Ralph began his head coaching career in 1992 at Georgetown University, where his men's and women's swim teams broke 17 school records in two years. He became head coach at Kutztown University in 1994 and produced nine All-Americans in 1996. Both the men's and women's teams finished among the nation's top 12 and broke a total of 32 records over two seasons. Ralph was chosen as the 1996 Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Coach of the Year. Later that year, he moved to the Air Force Academy, where both swim teams earned National All-Academic status with a team GPA of at least 3.2. While at Air Force, Ralph earned the Moyer-Nike Award for Excellence in Coaching Women in 1996 and the Air Force Award for Organizational Excellence in 1997.

"Ken has shown that you can have a bold and aggressive agenda for athletics, while not compromising academic integrity," said Dr. Eddie Ade Knowles, vice president for student life at Rensselaer, when introducing Ralph. "With his leadership, we will move Rensselaer athletics to even higher levels of excellence each year."

A native of Salem, N.H., Ralph is a graduate of the University of Alaska-Anchorage, with a degree in political science. He was a five-time NCAA Division II All-American in swimming (in 1989 in the 100- and 200-yard butterfly and in 1990 in the 100-yard butterfly and 100- and 200-yard backstroke) and went on to become a U.S. Senior National Qualifier in 1989 and 1990. He is a member of the Alaska-Anchorage Athletic Hall of Fame.

Ralph's community service activities have leveraged his athletic experiences. He participated in Camp Rotary, an academic and recreational camp for disadvantaged students in New London, and he was a mentor in the Conn. College Office of Volunteers for Community Service. He has also been a volunteer for many associations and has hosted the "Match" program with Big Brother/Big Sisters.

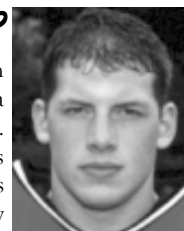
Ralph, who was named Rensselaer's 2003-04 Person of the Year by *The Polytechnic*, the school's student newspaper, and his wife, Mary, reside in Ballston Lake.

MIKE GRIFFIN *Assistant Athletic Director*

Mike Griffin is in his eleventh year as an assistant athletic director. In this role he is the home football game administrator and the staff advisor for the student-athlete advisory board. He also sets the schedule for the basketball programs, acts as the liaison with admissions for recruits, coordinates outside awards for the department's staff and handles NCAA drug testing consent for each of Rensselaer's

23 intercollegiate varsity programs.

In addition to his administrative duties, Griffin has been a head basketball coach at Rensselaer for the past 22 years. During his tenure, his teams have consistently produced winning seasons - including the only two 20-win seasons ever accomplished by the men's basketball team.

Six times in the 1990's Griffin's teams advanced to post-season tournaments. His 1990-91 squad won 18 games in a row on its way to a 20-4 regular season record and an NCAA Tournament berth. The 1995-96 team posted a 20-8 record, reaching the "Sweet 16" of the NCAA Tournament. More recently, the 1998-99 Red Hawks led all Division III teams in rebound margin and tied for second in scoring defense.

The 2005-06 season will be Griffin's 30th coaching college basketball. Twenty-five of those years have been as a head coach at Colgate University, Thiel College and Rensselaer.

A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., Griffin played college basketball at Columbia University, where he lettered three times, including his senior season in which he finished second in the Ivy League to Princeton's Bill Bradley in rebounding.



KEVIN BEATTIE *Sports Information Director*

Kevin Beattie is in his eighth year as the Institute's Sports Information Director.

Among his responsibilities is the handling of all publicity and public relations for Rensselaer's 21 Division III varsity sports, as well as the two Division I hockey teams. In addition, he is in charge of writing, editing and designing department publications, statistical compilation, game-day obligations

and press box management, media coordination, budget management and advertising.

Beattie, who was named the first-ever Rensselaer *Polytechnic* Person of the Year in 2001, is a member of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) as well as ECAC-SIDA. He also serves on the ESPN the Magazine Academic All-America Committee.

Prior to joining Rensselaer, Beattie spent four years with the Albany River Rats hockey team of the American Hockey League, the last three as the director of communications.

Beattie earned a bachelor's degree in psychology from Oneonta St. and a Masters of Business Administration from Rensselaer. He resides in Niskayuna with his wife, Stacey, and two-year old son, Nolan.



AMIE CANFIELD *Sports Information Assistant*

Amie Canfield is in her first year as the sports information assistant. A former part-time assistant in the Office of Athletic Communications at the University of Vermont, Canfield is the first full-time assistant in the Rensselaer's sports information department.

A native of St. Johnsbury, Vt., Canfield brings experience as an assistant, having spent the last three years working primarily with the men's and women's ice hockey programs at Vermont. She

began as a member of the statistical crew working for several sports including: men's and women's basketball, men's and women's lacrosse, and men's and women's ice hockey. Canfield took on a more in-depth role as an assistant to the directors in the following seasons, taking part in daily office duties and game-day management of both ice hockey programs.

A 2003 graduate of Vermont with a bachelor's degree in English, Canfield has served as a volunteer at numerous tournaments and championships and she has also been a team correspondent for several hockey publications.

THE 2005 SEASON OUTLOOK

While the 5-4 finish in 2004 was disappointing, there is reason for optimism for the Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute football team in 2005. Three of the Engineers' losses came by a combined total of 12 points, there are 28 letterwinners - including 16 starters - returning, and the entire coaching staff is back.

"Last year was a tough one," said seventeenth-year head coach Joe King. "When we didn't practice or play with consistency it cost us some ballgames. When we did, we showed we could be a pretty good team. I expect everyone, from the players to the coaches, will use last season as a learning experience."

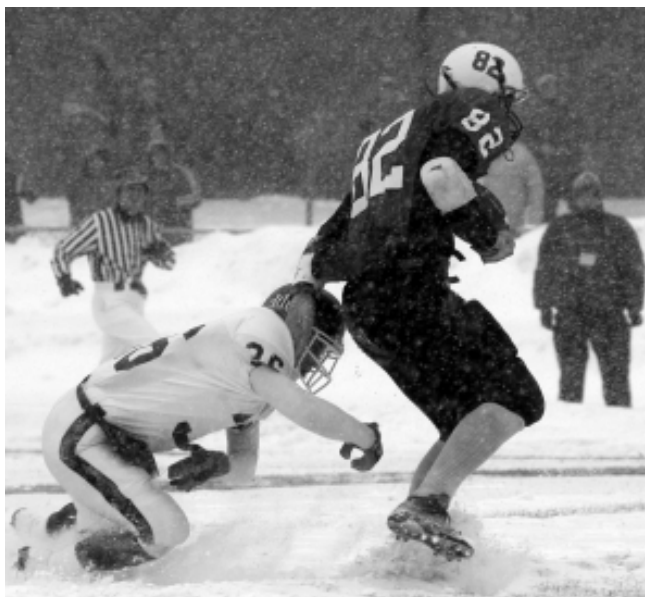
Of the 16 starters who return to the Troy, N.Y., campus nine are on offense, seven on defense and one on special teams. "There is some experience back on offense, both at the skill positions and on the line. Without a strong group up front, no team stands a chance," King said. "Defensively, we have some talented players coming back but we also have some work to do. The key to success for us is playing solid defense and winning the battle of turnovers."

THE OFFENSE

There is depth on offense, including at **quarterback**, where junior Frank Catellier (Voorheesville, NY/Voorheesville High School) played extensively last season and sophomore Josh Chiappone (Troy, NY/Troy) led the junior varsity. Catellier, the team's Offensive Most Improved Player, played in seven games, including six as the starter, completing 106 of 183 passes for 1,384 yards and 12 touchdowns. He averaged 197.7 yards per game and was intercepted eight times. Chiappone should challenge for time under center for a team that was twenty-second in the nation in passing offense last season, averaging 266.7 yards per contest.

Rensselaer's top **running back**, Jay Bernardo (East Greenbush, NY/LaSalle Institute), returns for his junior season. A captain, he rushed for 682 yards and a team-best nine touchdowns on 155 carries in nine games. He had at least one TD in six different games and he also caught eight passes for 47 yards. Bernardo was an All-Liberty League selection last year.

The corps of **receivers** features the return of RPI's top two pass catchers in junior tight end Jon Branche (Schenectady, NY/Colonie) and sophomore wideout Brendan McGowan (Mesa, AZ/Mountain View). A National All-American last season and a Pre-Season First Team All-American by D3Football.com, *Lindy's Football Annual* and *Street & Smith's Football Annual*, Branche caught 53 passes for 757 yards and eight touchdowns. The 6-4, 245-pound end had at least one reception in every game, had ten games with at least four catches and eight games with at least six receptions. The team's Offensive Most Valuable Player, he finished forty-fifth in the nation in receptions per game (5.9) and forty-

ninth in receiving yards per game (84.1). That followed a freshman campaign in which he had 39 receptions for 514 yards and seven touchdowns. Senior Adam Van Horn (Amherst, NY/Souhegan), a converted offensive lineman, and sophomore Chris Graef (Bethel, CT/Bethel) will also suit up as tight ends.

McGowan, the team's Rookie of the Year and an All-Liberty League choice, was fiftieth nationally in receptions per game with 5.7. He finished with 51 catches for 559 yards and three touchdowns. He caught at least one pass in every game and had five games with at least six receptions. Working their way into larger roles are sophomores Drew Utschig (Harrison, NY/Iona Prep), Joshua Reid (Albany, NY/Bishop Maginn) and Graham Boyd (Wappingers Falls, NY/John Jay). Utschig and Reid both saw substantial action on the junior varsity with Utschig also playing six varsity games, where he made five receptions for 90 yards. Boyd, who started on the JV as a freshman, redshirted last year.

The **offensive line**, which allowed only six sacks while helping Rensselaer rank thirty-seventh in Division III in total offense (409.7 yards per game) in 2004, returns five players who have seen time as starters. Seniors Jeff Douglas (Chelmsford, MA/Chelmsford) and Matt Pisano (Toms River, NJ/Toms River East) and junior Jake Russell (Washington, NJ/Warren Hills), an All-Liberty League selection, are two-year starters while juniors Matt Merrow (Keene, NH/Keene) and Shawn Herrmann (Phoenix, NY/C.W. Baker) both started for the first time last season. Sophomores Jeff Durocher (Schenectady, NY/Schalmont), Danny Caruso (Valley Stream, NY/Holy Trinity) and Grant Sanville (Westfield, VT/North Country) will also battle for time on the

offensive line.

THE DEFENSE

On defense, the Engineers return four of their top five tacklers. Among them is senior captain Honorio Borba (Freeville, NY/Dryden), who is one of three starters back on **the line**. He was the squad's top tackler from the down position, registering 59 stops, including 22 unassisted, 2.5 for lost yards (8) and a sack (4 yards). He had multiple tackles in every game and recorded at least five tackles in seven games, including one 13-tackle effort. Borba, the team's Defensive Most Improved Player, also forced one fumble.

Junior Bob Perreault (Troy, NY/Lansingburgh) and classmate Bryan McWayne (Cobleskill, NY/Cobleskill-Richmondville), are the two other starters returning to the defensive front four. Perreault, who has played in 20 of the 21 varsity games over the past two seasons, had 32 tackles last season, including 13 solo, 4.5 for lost yards (11) and one sack (5 yards). He also recovered a fumble and broke up two passes. McWayne, who is also entering his third varsity season, had 35 tackles (16 solos). Six of his stops were behind the line of scrimmage (22 yards), which ranked second on the team.

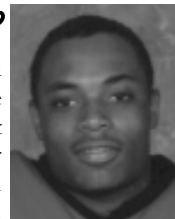
Battling for playing time in the trenches are senior Mark Byrne (Ludlow, MA/Ludlow) and sophomores Dan Belber (Niskayuna, NY/Niskayuna), Vince Scicchitano (Centerport, NY/Harborfields) and Doug Ingraham (Grand Island, NY/Grand Island). Byrne is a converted linebacker who made 17 tackles last season, including six unassisted, while Ingraham started on the offensive line. Scicchitano and Belber were starters on the junior varsity who also saw action on the varsity. Senior David Kenoyer (Plattsburgh, NY/Plattsburgh) and sophomore David Walker (Waterford, CT/Waterford) provide depth.

The **linebacker** position features two players who were in the top four on the team in tackles in graduate student Jimmy Motzkin (Lynnfield, MA/Lynnfield) and second-year captain Grant Cochran (Kent, WA/Kent-Meridian). Motzkin, who is 6-3, 220 pounds, ranked second on the team with 80 stops, including a team-best 44 unassisted and a team-high 12.5 for lost yards (49). The two-time National All-American javelin thrower also had three sacks (20 yards), an

interception with a ten-yard return, a fumble recovery that he returned 43 yards for a touchdown and a team-high eight pass breakups. Cochran, a senior who has been a starter since his freshman campaign, was fourth on the team with 65 tackles (37 solos), including 3.5 for lost yards (7), with three pass breakups. An All-Liberty League selection and a National ESPN the Magazine Academic All-American, he had at least two tackles in every game and five-or-more stops in eight games, including two ten-tackle efforts.

Also expected to see playing time in the middle of the defense are seniors Ryan Hickey (Tewksbury, MA/Tewksbury), Danny Pizzarelli (Poughkeepsie, NY/Franklin Roosevelt) and Armin Warner (Schenectady, NY/Schenectady), juniors Nick Foglia (Watervliet, NY/CBA), Dave Pompei (Burnt Hills, NY/Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake) and Mike Warner (Lafayette Hill, PA/Plymouth Whitmarsh) and sophomore Tom Rayhill (Grand Island, NY/Grand Island). Last season, Pizzarelli had five tackles (3 solos), including one for a four-yard loss, and Rayhill made 20 tackles (14 solos) and recovered a fumble. Foglia and Mike Warner split time between the junior varsity and the varsity while Pompei and Armin Warner suffered season-ending injury early in the campaign.

In the **secondary**, King and his team must overcome the loss of three starters. Junior Doug Teator (Mellenville, NY/Taconic Hills), who led

all defensive backs in tackles, is the lone returning starter. He finished with 36 stops, including 17 unassisted, one for lost yards (4), a forced fumble and four pass breakups. Senior captain Tim Frame (Scotia, NY/Scotia-Glenville), who played linebacker as a junior, moves back into the defensive backfield. He was third on the team with 70 tackles (38 solos) last season. Four-and-a-half of his stops were for lost yards (15), he intercepted one pass and broke up four others. Frame, a third-year varsity performer, tallied at least two tackles in every game and he had at least six tackles in seven contests.



Junior Brett Kebea was second in the Liberty League in PAT percentage (95.7%).

Among those expected to fill the gaps are Adam LoGiudice (Massapequa, NY/Massapequa) and Dean Spitzer (Lake George, NY/Lake George), both seniors, along with Brett Perron (Windham, NH/Central Catholic), a junior and John Tesiero (Amsterdam, NY/Amsterdam), a sophomore.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Although the Engineers must replace their punter, field goal **kicker** Brett Kebea (East Greenbush, NY/Columbia), who made his lone field goal attempt and 22-of-23 point-after-touchdowns, and **kickoff specialist** Drew Taranto (Baldwinsville, NY/C.W. Baker) are back. In addition, Rayhill, the **long snapper** who was the team's Special Teams Player of the Year, and LoGiudice, a **return man** who is an All-American lacrosse player, also fit into the mix again this season.

THE SCHEDULE

Rensselaer opens the 2005 season with two non-league home games at '86

Field. The Engineers make their season debut on September 10 against Endicott before hosting Utica in the Homecoming Weekend Game on September 17. Both games begin at 1pm.

RPI kicks off its seven-game Liberty League schedule with games at Hobart on September 24 (1pm) and at Coast Guard in the Shot Glass Trophy Game on October 1 (1:30pm). Rensselaer returns home for the next two games as St. Lawrence visits on October 8 (1pm) and King's Point makes its first appearance in Troy since 1960 on October 22 (2pm).

The final three weeks of the year has RPI at WPI for the Transit Trophy Game on October 29 (11am), home against Rochester for Senior Day on November 5 (1pm) and at Union for the Dutchman Shoes Trophy Game in the regular season finale on November 12 (1pm).

THE COACHING STAFF



JOE KING *Head Coach*

Rensselaer's winningest head football coach of all time, Joe King returns to the sidelines of '86 Field for his seventeenth season at the helm.

During his tenure, King has taken the program, which began in 1886, to new heights. In his 16 years he has compiled a 110-42-2 record for a .721 winning percentage, making him the most successful football coach in terms of wins and winning percentage in the 118-year history of Rensselaer football.

Over the past 13 seasons, King has a combined 96-31 (.756) mark, including two perfect regular seasons (9-0 in 1999, 8-0 in 2001), four League Championships (1997, 1998, 1999, 2001), five Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Championship Game appearances (1992, 1993, 1995, 1997, 2002) and three NCAA Playoff appearances (1999, 2001, 2003).

In 2003, King led the Engineers to a school-record 11 wins (11-2) and a spot in the Division III National Semi-Finals for the first time in school history. It was RPI's third NCAA Tournament appearance - and fourth trip to the post-season - in the past five years. Among the team's 11 victories were wins in all three of its Trophy Games and the school's first NCAA Tournament win. The Engineers ranked among the leaders in the nation in numerous statistical categories and established more than 50 school records. In the final national rankings, Rensselaer was listed in the top ten in all three polls and was recognized as the ECAC Division III Upstate Team of the Year. RPI was also the recipient of the prestigious Division III Lambert Meadowlands Team of the Year Award. Five players earned All-American recognition and King and his staff were honored as the league's Coaching Staff of the Year. In addition, King was selected as the East Region Coach of the Year, the Division III Coach of the Year by Schutt Sports and Rensselaer's Coach of the Year, as selected by the school's coaching staff.

In 2002, the Engineers finished 8-2 overall, including wins in the Shot Glass Trophy Game against Coast Guard, the Transit Trophy Game against

WPI and the ECAC Northeast Championship Game at Worcester St. The victory over the Lancers gave Rensselaer a win in every one of the school's five ECAC Games.

The 2001 season marked the second time in the past three the Engineers posted an undefeated regular season (8-0) and were selected to the 28-team NCAA Tournament that determines the Division III National Champion. Rensselaer, which won its fourth league title in the past five years that season, was the top seed in the East Region and played in the second round of the playoffs for the first time in history.

In 1999, the Engineers won their third straight league title while compiling a perfect regular season (9-0) on their way to being invited to the NCAA Playoffs for the first time in school history. In addition, the team climbed to the highest rankings ever at that time in two national polls. RPI also led the entire nation in turnover margin, ranked third in scoring defense, sixth in pass efficiency defense and seventh in rushing defense.

King, a four-time league Coach of the Year, also led the Engineers to a tremendous campaign in 1997 when Rensselaer was 9-1, including a nine-game winning streak. The only loss came in overtime to eventual NCAA qualifier Coast Guard in the season opener. Rensselaer was ranked as high as fifth in the NCAA Regional rankings and went on to win its fourth ECAC title in six years. King and his assistants not only earned league Staff of the Year honors but they also won the ECAC Upstate New York award.

Since King took over the reigns in 1989 more than 30 pre-season All-Americans, 15 post-season All-Americans (including Rensselaer's first American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) First Team All-American in 1996) and many All-Region and All-Conference honorees have worn the RPI uniform. Additionally, all six of the school's First Team National Academic All-Americans have suited up for King. Under his tutelage, the Engineers have tied or set almost every school record.

A native of nearby Ballston Spa, N.Y., King is accustomed to winning, not only in college but also at the high school level, earning an impressive 52-23-3 (.686) record. He began his coaching career at St. Peter's High School in Saratoga Springs, N.Y., where he served as athletic director, football coach and baseball coach. He turned around a football program that had not claimed a single win in the previous five seasons. In his second year, King led St. Peter's to a 7-1 record, as well as to ninth place in



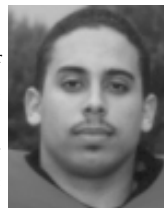

the New York State rankings. King also led the baseball team to the Parochial League Championship in his two seasons as head coach.

After two years at St. Peter's, he went on to Watervliet High School, where he inherited a program that had only one winning season in 23 years. In his seven years with the Cannoneers, King compiled a 44-16-2 (.726) mark. He guided the team to six winning seasons, including 1979 when it went 8-0-1 and won the Section 2 Class C title. While at Watervliet, King, who also taught social studies, was named the Troy Area High School Coach of the Year by *The Record* four times and the Capitaland High School Coach of the Year once by the *Times Union*. Among the players he mentored was Tim Sherwin, who went on to have a standout career as a tight end with the Baltimore Colts and the New York Giants in the National Football League.

King, who was named the 2002 Rensselaer Person of the Year by the staff of *The Polytechnic*, the student newspaper, as well as the Coach of the Year by the Institute's coaching staff, arrived at Rensselaer in 1981, spending his first five seasons as an assistant coach. He then enjoyed a three-year stint as associate head coach before being appointed head coach in 1989.

In addition to his duties as head football coach, King also serves as an assistant athletic director, a position he has held for the past five years. Among his duties in that role are handling the athletic department's internship program as well as heading the department's safety issues and

concerns. He has also been the head track & field coach.

A 1970 graduate of Siena College with a bachelor's degree in history, King played for both the football and baseball teams as an undergraduate.

He and his wife, Gail, make their home in Saratoga Springs. They have two grown sons, Joe and Kevin.

SAMSON BROWN

Wide Receivers

Samson Brown is in his second year with the Engineers. He coached the defensive backs last season.

Brown spent 2003 as a full-time assistant coach at Siena College. While with the Saints he coached the defensive backs and assisted in creating and

organizing the defense's practices and game plans.

A 2003 graduate of the University of Albany with a Bachelor of Arts degree in information science and policy, Brown also spent two summers as an intern for pro player personnel with the New York Giants of the National Football League. Among his duties were to scout and report on the team's defensive backs, organize and record statistical information and research and maintain journals of football strategies. He also provided updates concerning the team's opponents for the upcoming season.

As a player, Brown was a standout free safety for the Great Danes. He was a four-year starter, a three-time All-Northeast Conference First Team selection and once a Second Team choice. A captain of the 2002 conference championship team, he ranks in the top ten in school history in all-time tackles. He also had seven interceptions during his career.



DAN COLE

Quarterbacks

After spending three seasons as the Engineers starting quarterback, Dan Cole is in his second year as a coach for Rensselaer.

As a player, Cole set nearly every school passing record, completing 671 of 1,202 passes for 8,902 yards and 87 touchdowns in 32 games. He averaged 277.1 yards per game while throwing only 26 interceptions. The Albany, N.Y., native also ran 333 times for 823 yards and 13 touchdowns.

As a senior, Cole threw for 3,679 yards, 40 touchdowns and just 11 interceptions in 13 games, leading the Engineers to a school-record 11 wins (11-2) and the NCAA National Semi-Finals. The Liberty League Offensive Performer of the Week four times, he also ran for 276 yards and two touchdowns. He was voted the Offensive Player of the Year by the Liberty League and the ECAC and was a multiple National All-American. He went on to have a tryout with the NFL's New England Patriots.

Cole, the team's Offensive Most Valuable Player three times during his career, graduated in 2004 with a degree in electronic media arts and communication.



PAT DELMONACO

OC & Offensive Line

Pasquale "Pat" DelMonaco, Jr. is in his third season at Rensselaer, where he will again be coaching the offensive line. In addition, he will serve as the offensive coordinator and continue his role as the recruiting coordinator.

During DelMonaco's first two seasons, the Engineers have averaged over 5.7 yards per play and more than 425 yards per contest, including 281 passing. The team has rushed for over 100 yards in 12 of 21 games and over 200 yards five times while Rensselaer's quarterbacks have thrown for over 300 yards nine times and over 400 yards four times.

DelMonaco, whose offensive line allowed only six sacks in 2004, joined the Engineers from Hudson Valley Community College, where he coached the offensive line in his first two years and the quarterbacks in his third and final season. Between his second and third year with the Vikings, DelMonaco was a graduate assistant with the offensive line at the University of Illinois.

As a player, the Sleepy Hollow, N.Y., native played center at the University at Albany from 1996 to 2000, captaining the team as a senior. During his four years, the Great Danes posted a 35-7 overall record and won two Eastern Football Conference Championships (1997, 1998).

DelMonaco, who earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in history in 2000, resides in Niskayuna with his wife, Kelly, and their daughter, Julia.



WILL HEADEN

Outside Linebackers

Assisting for his sixteenth season, Will Headen is in his second stint as the coach of the linebackers after spending the previous seven years with the defensive secondary. He will continue to assist with the kickoff unit.

Prior to coaching the defensive backs, Headen served two years leading the running backs, while the team's running game enjoyed two of its most successful seasons in the history of the program. He began his Rensselaer coaching career with the linebackers before spending the next five seasons mentoring the defensive ends.

A native of Baltimore, Md., Headen has been affiliated with RPI even longer than his coaching career. An outstanding linebacker and defensive end for four years for the Engineers, he notched 222 career tackles, including a team-leading 111 in 1988. In addition, he finished his career as the school record-holder in sacks in a game with 3.5 against St. Lawrence.



DAVON JONES

Defensive Line

Davon Jones is in his second season as an assistant coach at Rensselaer.

Born in Brooklyn, N.Y., Jones grew up in Albany, where he was a captain and a standout defensive end at Albany High School. Following a two-year stint at Alfred University, he transferred to the University of Albany. A two-year starter on the defensive line with the Great Danes, he was a member of the school's 1998 Eastern Football Conference Championship team as well as the 1999 squad that played in the Northeast Conference Championship Game.

Following graduation, Jones played for the Metro Mallers of the Empire Football League. He was the 2002 Defensive Rookie of the Year and an all-star in his first two seasons.

Jones, who earned a degree in rhetoric & communication, as well as a minor in business, has also served the institute as the resident assistant for the Theta Chi fraternity.

DC & Defensive Backs

Chad Martinovich is in his second season with the Engineers. He spent the 2004 season as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

Martinovich came to Troy after spending three years as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Hamilton College. Prior to his stint with the Continentals, he was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Swarthmore College for three seasons. A former quarterback at Hobart College, Martinovich has also coached the defensive line at Bucknell University (1994), the linebackers at Hamilton (1995-96) and the wide receivers at the University of Albany (1997).

A Plattsburgh, N.Y., native, Martinovich graduated from Hobart in 1994 and earned his master's degree from Albany in 2002. He resides in Colonie with his wife, Erin, and daughter, Hailey.

Inside Linebackers

Kevin King is in his second season of his second stint as a coach for the Engineers, having also served as the team's intern. For the second straight year, he will coach the linebackers and assist with special teams.

In addition to his duties with football, King will again serve as the head coach of the junior varsity baseball team. A 2001 graduate of Rensselaer with a degree in management, he was a member of the nationally-ranked baseball team.

King and his wife, Melissa, reside in Troy.

Tight Ends

Bob Schoonmaker, who will coach the tight ends as well as assist with the special teams, is in his third season with the Engineers.

Schoonmaker came to Troy after spending eight years as the head coach at Granville Central School, where he led the team to the 1995 Division Championship - its first since 1981 - and was named Coach of the Year by the *Greenwich Journal Press*.

Schoonmaker started coaching in 1992 as the defensive coordinator for Whitehall Central School, where his unit was not scored upon in five consecutive games during the 1993 season.

A four-year inside linebacker and tight end under Joe King at Watervliet High School, Schoonmaker was a member of the Canoneers' 1979 undefeated Colonial Council and Section II Class C Championship team, earning numerous honors, including All-State recognition.

Schoonmaker, who attended Hudson Valley Community College and Adirondack Community College, resides in Granville, with his wife of 18 years, Dorie, and two daughters, Rachel and Renee.

Bob Conway, the assistant to the vice provost, assists with projects and issues related to undergraduate education at Rensselaer and coordinates academic advising services for Rensselaer's student-athletes. Formerly the director of the Advising and Learning Assistance Center, he has worked closely with the student-athletes, as well as with the coaching staff and administration, to ensure that Rensselaer's student-athletes maintain one of the highest graduation rates in the nation - at any level.

For his previous position, Conway was responsible for starting a number of programs aimed at assisting RPI's students through their academic careers. Under his leadership, the Center oversaw the development of a variety of new advising programs, including the Faculty Intervention Program, Meet Your Advisor Day and an extensive website of advising information.

2004 GAME-BY-GAME SUMMARIES

Rensselaer 42, Endicott 7

BEVERLY, Mass. (Sept. 11) - The Engineers got the 2004 season off to a solid start both offensively and defensively in a 42-7 win at Endicott. On offense, freshman quarterback Chad Wysocki came off the bench to complete 19-of-37 passes for 338 yards and three touchdowns while three receivers had over 100 yards each. Defensively, RPI held the Gulls to just 139 total yards, including 59 through the air, and nine first downs. Senior linebacker Sean Doran led in tackles with 11, including nine unassisted and one for lost yards (2).



The offensive line helped RPI gain a school-record 501 yards passing at Endicott.

Following a scoreless first quarter, the Engineers struck at 14:19 of the second when senior captain Dan Stephens caught a 20-yard touchdown pass from starting quarterback Frank Catellier to put RPI ahead, 7-0. Rensselaer doubled its lead nine minutes later when Wysocki, who replaced an injured Catellier, connected with classmate Brendan McGowan from 39 yards out for a score.

After overcoming an imbalance of more plays (17) than total yards (16) in the first quarter, Endicott's offense connected for three consecutive first downs to get on the scoreboard. Sophomore Jeff Trinquen ran into the end zone from nine yards out to make the score 14-7 in favor of the visitors and the score remained that way as the half expired.

In the second half, RPI tacked on 14 points in both quarters while holding Endicott scoreless. The Engineers' first touchdown of the third quarter came from senior running back Otis Williams, who scored on a two-yard run at 11:06. Wysocki then found

sophomore tight end Jon Branche for two touchdowns, including a four-yard strike at 4:33 of the third and a 14-yarder at 12:37 of the fourth quarter. Jay Bernardo added a three-yard TD run.

In addition to Wysocki, another strong contributor to Rensselaer's offensive attack was Catellier, who completed 13-of-19 passes for 163 yards and a touchdown. As a team, RPI threw for a school-record 501 yards. On the receiving end, McGowan caught 11 passes for 130 yards and two scores and Stephens had eight receptions for a game-high 194 yards and one touchdown. Williams finished with 61 yards and a touchdown on 18 carries and Bernardo rushed 11 times for 32 yards and a TD.

Joining Doran as defensive stalwarts were seniors Jimmy Motzkin, who had six solo tackles, and Brent Hanson, who had four stops (2 solos), an interception with a ten-yard return and a pass breakup.

Sophomore Jameson Pelkey (4-for-14, 28 yards, 2 INT) and freshman Alex Smith (4-for-12, 31 yards, 1 INT) shared the quarterback responsibilities for the Gulls. Sophomore Scott Peters led the team with four receptions for 37 yards.

Sophomore Orlando Johnson had a team-high eight tackles (6 solos) and three pass breakups while junior Mike Farrell made seven tackles (5 solos) with three pass breakups.

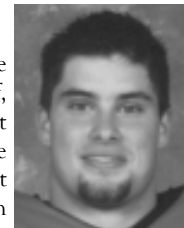

Hobart 54, Rensselaer 13

TROY, N.Y. (Sept. 25) - Hobart scored 54 unanswered points on 536 yards of total offense in a 54-13 win in the Liberty League opener for both teams.

The Engineers got off to a quick 13-0 lead, taking advantage of two Hobart fumbles on the Statesmen's first two possessions. On the first, Rensselaer senior linebacker Jimmy Motzkin picked up a loose ball and ran 43-yards to the end zone. Brad Morgan's point-after-kick was good and RPI led 7-0 with 13:50 left in the first quarter. The Engineers recovered another Hobart fumble on the visitor's next possession, which led to a 43-yard touchdown pass from freshman quarterback Chad Wysocki to senior Dan Stephens. The scoring strike was the fourth play of a 60-yard drive.

The Statesmen's first touchdown came on a one-yard plunge by sophomore quarterback Shawn Mizro at 10:45 of the first quarter. Hobart, which failed on the conversion, started its drive on Rensselaer's 13-yard line thanks to a 79-yard kickoff return by senior Rick Pinero. Following a 28-yard Eric Ampuja field goal, the Statesmen took a 16-13 lead on an 11-yard run by senior Jack

Holleran. The touchdown culminated an eight-play, 50-yard drive that took 3:27 off the clock.

The Statesmen added ten points in the second quarter to up their lead to 26-13 at halftime. Mizro hit Pinero from 21 yards out with 6:39 remaining to cap a nine-play, 55-yard drive and Ampuja kicked a 34-yard field goal. On the touchdown drive, Holleran carried five times for 24 yards and Ty Godinho ran twice for 14 yards. The highlight of the drive that resulted in the field goal, which began at Hobart's seven-yard line, was a 70-yard completion from Mizro to Pinero.

Hobart added 14 points in the third quarter, including a 30-yard touchdown pass from Mizro to senior Dan Suozzi at 9:27. Holleran then scored from three yards out for a 40-13 lead with six minutes left in the quarter.

A 13-yard touchdown run by Doug Blakowski early in the fourth quarter put the Statesmen ahead, 47-13, and a fumble recovery in the end zone by junior Andrew Sweet increased Hobart's lead to 54-13 with 9:47 left in the fourth quarter.

Holleran finished with 112 yards and two touchdowns on 20 carries while Godhino rushed for 69 yards on 16 carries. Mizro completed 9-of-16 passes for 232 yards and two TDs, including six completions to Pinero, who had 152 yards and a TD.



Rensselaer 28, Coast Guard 17

TROY, N.Y. (Oct. 2) - Sophomore running back Jay Bernardo rushed for 220 yards and three touchdowns and senior Otis Williams added 111 yards on the ground to lead Rensselaer to a 28-17 victory. With the win, the Engineers retain the Shot Glass Trophy.

RPI got off to a solid start, taking a 7-0 lead on a 17-play, 89-yard drive that took 7:33 off the clock on its first possession. Bernardo, who set career-highs for carries (44), rushing yards and touchdowns, capped the drive, which featured 59 yards on the ground and two successful fourth-down conversions, with a two-yard plunge with 5:22 remaining in the first quarter. Brett Kebea's extra point attempt was good.

The Bears answered with a 24-yard field goal by junior Tom Crowley with 8:14 remaining in the second quarter. The field goal completed a 13-play, 51-yard drive that had a successful fake punt on a fourth-and-11 play.

Rensselaer increased its lead to 14-3 with a 12-play, 87-yard drive to open the second half. Bernardo capped the drive with a 17-yard rush around the right side on a fourth-and-two play. Kebea again hit the extra point. The Bears answered right back with an impressive drive of their own, highlighted by a 16-yard scoring strike

from junior quarterback Cory Anderson to tight end Brian Steuerwald. Crowley's extra point pulled Coast Guard to within four points, 14-10, with 8:38 left in the third.

The Engineers took advantage of a Coast Guard fumble on a punt return to move ahead 21-10 early in the fourth quarter. Bernardo scored his third touchdown of the game on a one-yard run to complete a four-play, 31-yard drive with 13:53 left in the quarter. Wysocki then hit senior wide receiver Dan Stephens on a 40-yard touchdown pass with 9:30 left in the quarter for a 28-10 lead. Kebea connected on the extra point on both scores. The Bears got a five-yard touchdown pass from Anderson to Brendan McKinnon and a Crowley extra point with 6:40 remaining for the final margin.

Rensselaer, which snapped a two-game losing streak, outgained Coast Guard 493 to 341, including a 333-67 advantage on the ground. Wysocki completed 15-of-25 passes for 160 yards and a touchdown.

Defensively, senior linebacker Sean Doran had seven tackles, including two unassisted, with two pass breakups and an interception.

For the Bears, Anderson registered 274 yards and two touchdowns on 28-of-46 passing. He was intercepted once. Steuerwald had eight receptions for 94 yards - both game-highs - and a touchdown.

Defensively, sophomore linebacker Nolan Robinson had a game-high 13 tackles, including five unassisted for the Statesmen, who held Rensselaer to 291 yards of total offense.

For the Engineers, Wysocki completed 19-of-38 passes for 198 yards and a touchdown. He was intercepted twice. Sophomore Jay Bernardo led the ground attack with 62 yards on 11 carries while Stephens had 88 receiving yards and a touchdown on five catches.

Tim Frame (6 solos) and Mark Byrne (2 solos) paced the defense with nine tackles apiece.

Hardwick scored from two yards out just 89 seconds into the fourth quarter to pull the Blue and Gray within 34-20, but a 29-yard field goal by RPI sophomore placekicker Brett Kebea with just over eight minutes left in the game iced the contest.

Bernardo ran 25 times for 107 yards and two touchdowns, while McGowan caught eight passes for 118 yards and a touchdown.

Nine of Grant Cochran's game-high ten tackles were solo stops, while Jimmy Motzkin (nine tackles) added two tackles for lost yards and 1.5 sacks.

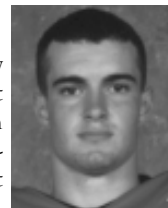
Patterson and Dave Taliaferro, who had nine tackles apiece, and Matt Fuhrman, who tallied eight stops.

TROY, N.Y. (Oct. 30)-Rensselaer jumped out to a 35-6 lead behind four touchdown passes from sophomore quarterback Frank Catellier and held off WPI, 35-33.

Rensselaer opened a 7-0 lead on its first possession when sophomore running back Jay Bernardo scored on a two-yard plunge at 9:29 of the first quarter. Brett Kebea hit the extra point to finish the series, which covered eight plays and 61 yards. RPI increased its lead less than two minutes later when Catellier hit Otis Williams from nine yards out with 7:46 left in the opening stanza. Rensselaer's possession was set up at the nine-yard line by a blocked punt by senior Ramses Jimenez. Kebea's extra point made it 14-0 in favor of the home team. WPI put together a solid drive to get on the board just before the first quarter ended. The 15-play, 84-yard march, which featured 12 running plays, was capped by a one-yard run by Brian Farragher.

RPI went ahead 21-6 on a 28-yard touchdown pass from Catellier to senior Dan Stephens at 7:11 of the second quarter. The drive, which was highlighted by a 49-yard pass from Catellier to sophomore tight end Jon Branche, covered 99 yards in 11 plays in 4:28. Catellier then hooked up with freshman Brendan McGowan from ten yards out with just eight seconds remaining in the second quarter to make it 28-6 at halftime. RPI's final scoring drive of the half covered 46 yards in one minute after the Engineers' defense held on a fourth down play.

Rensselaer started the second half with another Catellier touchdown pass, this time from 53 yards out to Williams. A running back, Williams made a one-handed catch before scampering down the center of the field and into the end zone. The visiting Engineers answered right back on a six-yard touchdown run by senior quarterback Ryan Jennette on their first possession of the third quarter. The touchdown was the first of four in a row by WPI.

A 15-yard touchdown run by Preston Roberts just 34 seconds into the fourth quarter pulled WPI to within 15 points, making the score 35-20 in RPI's favor. WPI then recovered an onside-kick and took advantage when Farragher scored on a seven-yard run with 10:46 remaining in the fourth quarter. The extra point was missed and Rensselaer led, 35-26. The drive was aided by two big RPI plays; the first was an 18-yard scramble on a third and 14 from the Engineers 21 yard line by Catellier and the second was a Catellier to freshman receiver Brendan McGowan pass for 25 yards on a third-and-12 from the Rochester 27 yard line. The extra point was hit by sophomore kicker Brett Kebea.

On its first possession of the second half, Rensselaer used a little trickery to get the ball into scoring position. On a second-and-nine play, McGowan got a lateral from Catellier, who then received the ball back on a pass and advanced it to the Rochester 33 yard line. After completions to freshman receiver Drew

Utschig and McGowan, Catellier hit sophomore tight end John Branche for a four-yard touchdown. Kebea's kick was good and the score was tied at 14-14.

Early in the fourth quarter, RPI once again used the big play to break the deadlock. First, Molisani was picked off by senior linebacker Sean Doran at the Rochester 36 and he returned it to the 27 yard line. On the very next play, Catellier hit Branche for a 27-yard touchdown and after Kebea hit the extra point, RPI led for the first time, 21-14. Rochester was forced to punt on a three-and-out on its next possession and RPI iced the game with a nine-play, 70-yard drive that ended with senior running back Otis Williams driving in from a yard out. That run was set up by a 17-yard Catellier to Branche reception

down to the one yard line. Kebea hit his fourth extra point and RPI widened the lead to 28-14.

Offensively, Rochester and RPI both recorded 435 yards of offense on the day. The Yellowjackets ran for 168 and passed for 267 while the Engineers ran for 163 and passed for 272.

Molisani completed 26 of 47 for 267 yards and a touchdown. He was also the 'Jackets leading rusher with 85 yards on 15 carries and a touchdown. Toolan registered six catches for 95 yards and a touchdown, all of which are career-highs, while Bielecki, who had 75 rushing yards, added a career-high six grabs for 43 yards.

RPI saw Catellier throw for 251 yards and two touchdowns on 17-of-35 passing. Bernardo led the way on the ground with 72 yards on 16 carries

while Catellier and Williams added 48 and 46 yards, respectively. Branche totaled 127 yards on seven catches and added two scores while McGowan, in addition to throwing for 21 yards, added six catches for 82 yards.

Defensively, Rochester freshman safety Jim Milks and Ray Finocchio each recorded ten tackles to lead the way. Milks added a forced fumble and a pass breakup while Finocchio also had a tackle for loss and a pass breakup. Junior linebacker Matt Simon had nine tackles, 1.5 tackles for loss, two pass breakups and a sack.

RPI saw Jimmy Motzkin record a game-high 13 tackles including 5.5 for lost yards (24), one pass breakup and a sack (10 yards). Doran added ten tackles to go along with his interception and Grant Cochran registered ten tackles.

Union 18, Rensselaer 13

TROY, N.Y. (Nov. 13) - A Brian Griffin interception late in the fourth quarter set up the game-winning touchdown pass from Anthony Marotti to Ryan Twitchell with 1:27 left in the fourth quarter to give Union an 18-13 victory in the Dutchman Shoes Trophy Game. The game was the 102nd meeting between the two teams - the oldest college football rivalry in New York State. Possession of the Shoes has now alternated in each of the last eight years.

Union jumped on top 6-0 with a touchdown on its first possession. Sophomore running back Tom Arcidiacano capped an eight-play, 57-yard drive with a ten-yard run over the right side 3:50 into the opening quarter. The extra point was missed. The Dutchmen, who forced two turnovers in the opening half, also attempted a field goal during the second quarter but missed it wide right.

Following a scoreless third quarter, the Engineers went ahead on a two-yard touchdown pass from sophomore quarterback Frank Catellier to senior wide receiver Dan Stephens early in the fourth quarter. RPI's drive, which covered 21 yards on four plays, was set up by an outstanding

interception from senior Jimmy Motzkin late in the third quarter. Brett Kebea's extra point made it 7-6 in favor of the Engineers with 14:15 remaining in the fourth quarter. The Dutchmen came right back to regain the lead on their next possession on a 31-yard touchdown pass from Marotti to Steve Angiletta with 12:02 left in the fourth quarter. RPI then returned the ensuing kickoff 25 yards, leading to a nine-yard touchdown pass from Catellier to sophomore Jon Branche with 9:25 left, putting the Engineers ahead 13-12. The highlight of the drive was a 36-yard pass from Catellier to freshman Drew Utschig.

Union then turned the ball over on downs, Rensselaer was forced to punt and Marotti lost a fumble, giving the Engineers the ball with three minutes left. However, Griffin intercepted Catellier on a third-and-six play, putting the Dutchmen at the RPI 43-yard line with 2:06 remaining. Marotti completed three straight passes, including the TD to Twitchell, to give the visitors an 18-13 lead. Rensselaer had one final opportunity but turned the ball over on downs.

Marotti, a sophomore, completed 21-of-40 passes for a school single-game record 418 yards. He had two touchdowns and two interceptions. Angiletta led all receivers with nine catches for 173 yards and a score while Twitchell finished with eight catches for 162 yards and a touchdown. Arcidiacano carried the ball 30 times for 101 yards before leaving in the fourth quarter with an injury.

Defensively, Alex Smith made ten tackles, including an eight-yard sack, while James Baron had eight tackles, including five unassisted, a forced fumble and a pass breakup.

For Rensselaer, Catellier completed 12-of-27 passes for 131 yards and two touchdowns. He was intercepted twice. Branche had six catches for 64 yards and a touchdown while senior Otis Williams rushed 19 times for 89 yards.

Motzkin finished with 13 tackles, including seven unassisted, one for lost yards (5), an interception with a ten-yard return and six pass breakups. Tim Frame (5 solos) and Sean Doran (3 solos) each had a game-high 14 tackles.

Rensselaer 28, Bridgewater St. 25 • Swenson Field • Bridgewater, MA
Quarterback Brandon Grabowski threw for 175 yards and a touchdown and rushed for two more scores, including the game-winning TD at 8:03 of the fourth quarter to lead Rensselaer to a victory in its first-ever post-season appearance. Kurt Stapleton added 99 yards on the ground and Dave Eddy had 15 tackles (7 solos) and a pass breakup. With the win, the Engineers set a new school record for victories in a season (8-2).

1993 ECAC NORTHWEST CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

Rensselaer 13, Plymouth St. 10 • '86 Field • Troy, NY
In the first home playoff game in the program's history, the defense stifled the Panthers, holding the visitors to just 2.7 yards per play (169 total yards). Chris Mastergeorge led the way with 12 tackles, including three unassisted, and a pass breakup. Offensively, running back J.P. Peterson, the game's Most Valuable Player, rushed for 137 yards and quarterback Brandon Grabowski threw for a touchdown and ran for another.

1995 ECAC NORTHWEST CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

Rensselaer 69, Worcester St. 12 • Ned Harkness Field • Troy, NY
In the first football game ever played at Ned Harkness Field, running back Dan McGovern rushed for a school-record 320 yards and four touchdowns, including runs of 48, 58, 6 and 15 yards, to lead the Engineers over the Lancers. Rensselaer scored 13 points in the first quarter, 17 in the second, 27 in the third and 12 in the fourth on its way to scoring the second most points in a single game in school history.

1997 ECAC NORTHEAST CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

Rensselaer 14, Worcester St. 13 • John Coghlin Field • Worcester, MA
Defensive back Matt Vittengl blocked a Worcester St. extra point attempt with 2:53 to play to seal the victory for the Engineers. Quarterback Matt Robbens led RPI, throwing for a touchdown and running for another to earn the game's Most Valuable Player Award. Vittengl finished with seven tackles, including a team-high six solos, two pass breakups, an interception and the blocked kick.

1999 NCAA FIRST ROUND PLAYOFF GAME

Rowan 29, Rensselaer 10 • Ned Harkness Field • Troy, NY
In the first NCAA Playoff Game in the program's history, Rowan scored

on its first two possessions and held Rensselaer out of the end zone until the fourth quarter. The loss was the first of the season for the Engineers, who posted the first perfect regular season record (9-0) in the school's history. Matt Vittengl finished with a game-high 21 tackles (16 solos).

2001 NCAA SECOND ROUND PLAYOFF GAME

Ithaca 27, Rensselaer 10 • '86 Field • Troy, NY
Following a Rensselaer field goal, Ithaca scored three straight touchdowns and controlled the clock on its way to victory. RPI, which was playing its first-ever NCAA Second Round game after earning the top seed and a first round bye, finished with an 8-1 record. Wide receiver Evan Cochran made nine receptions for 147 yards while Marc Blevins had 16 tackles (9 solos) and an interception in the loss.

2002 ECAC NORTHWEST CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

Rensselaer 55, Worcester St. 29 • Coughlin Field • Worcester, MA
Evan and Flynn Cochran accounted for five touchdowns, including two in the second quarter when the Engineers exploded for 35 points to take an insurmountable lead. Evan caught a TD pass and ran for another while Flynn rushed for three scores. Quarterback Dan Cole, the game's MVP, threw one scoring strike and ran for two others.

2003 NCAA FIRST ROUND PLAYOFF GAME

Rensselaer 34, Curry 20 • '86 Field • Troy, NY
Rensselaer earned its first-ever NCAA Playoff Game victory behind four touchdown passes from Dan Cole, including three to Flynn Cochran. Cole finished with 362 yards through the air while Cochran caught 15 passes for 216 yards. Defensively, Grant Cochran had 18 tackles, including six unassisted and a sack (4 yards), with a pass breakup.

2003 NCAA SECOND ROUND PLAYOFF GAME

Rensselaer 40, Springfield 34 • Benedum Field • Springfield, MA
In a game with 40 miles-per-hour winds, quarterback Dan Cole threw for 348 yards and five touchdowns as the fifth-seeded Engineers upended top-seeded Springfield. Grant Cochran finished with 13 tackles, including ten unassisted and two for lost yards (7), to lead a defense that did not allow a pass completion.

2003 NCAA REGIONAL FINAL PLAYOFF GAME

Rensselaer 21, Ithaca 16 • '86 Field • Troy, NY
Playing for the first time ever in the month of December, Rensselaer scored on long pass plays on its first two possessions and held off the visiting Bombers in a game played in blizzard-like conditions. Quarterback Dan Cole tallied 268 yards passing and three touchdowns while wide receiver Pat Hughes had 12 receptions for 144 yards and a touchdown.

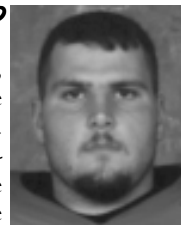
2003 NCAA NATIONAL SEMI-FINAL PLAYOFF GAME

St. John's 38, Rensselaer 10 • Clemens Stadium • Collegeville, MN
St. John's broke open a tie game with a third quarter touchdown and three more in the fourth to end Rensselaer's most successful season ever. The Engineers, who got 237 yards passing and 21 yards rushing from quarterback Dan Cole, concluded the season with a school-record 11 wins (11-2). RPI, which got nine tackles (6 solos) from linebacker Chris Pierz, would later be awarded the ECAC Upstate Team of the Year Award as well as the program's first-ever Lambert Trophy. The Johnnies, who saw running back Josh Nelson compile 47 rushing yards and 192 receiving yards, went on to win the 2003 National Championship.

ANNUAL TROPHY GAMES

Once again, the Engineers will play three Trophy Games - the Shot Glass Trophy Game against Coast Guard (since 1944), the Dutchman Shoes Trophy Game vs. Union (since 1950) and the Transit Trophy Game against WPI (since 1980).

Shot Glass Trophy Game

Presented to Coast Guard by Allan Colvin, an RPI alum living in Connecticut, it was purloined from a Troy hotel during his reunion in 1944 to show how small the drinks were. Admiral James Pim, then the superintendent of the academy, remarked it should be awarded to the winner each year. Coast Guard leads the series, 33-18-2.

Transit Trophy Game

Following the 1979 contest it was decided by the athletic directors of both schools to create a trophy for this long-standing rivalry. A transit was chosen because both schools feature engineering as part of their curriculum. RPI leads the series, 16-8-1.

Dutchman Shoes Trophy Game

It was presented by student committees from the schools after much looting was done on both campuses following the 1949 contest between the two rivals. Union currently leads the series 43-12-0.

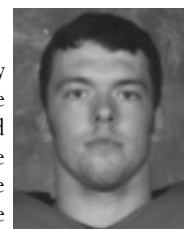

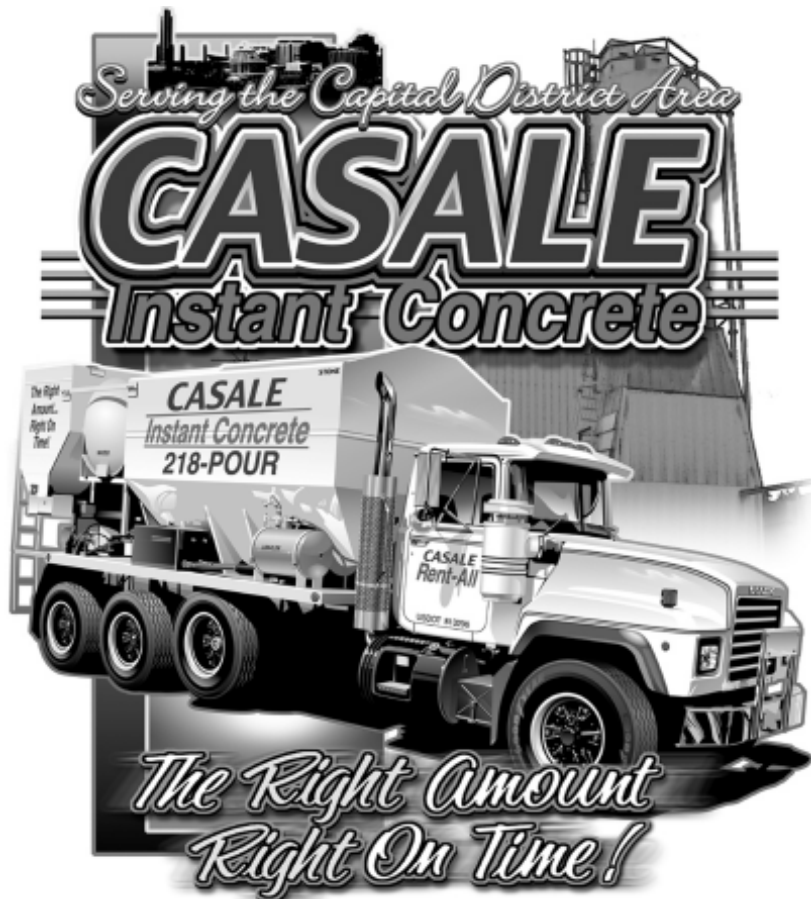

RENSSELAER'S FOOTBALL HELMET HISTORY

Prior to 1939: Leather helmets were in use with cross/hatch markings. The colors of the helmets and stripes are not discernable from existing photographs. Helmets were generally worn (although optional) in the years leading up to 1937, when the NCAA made them mandatory.

1939-47: White without logo, either leather or shell style.

1948-53: Red without logo, shell style now in common use.

1954-63: Red with a center white stripe, no logo.

1964-65: White with a center red stripe, either a small white "R" logo

or no logo on the side. Both styles were in use concurrently.

1966: Either red with a center white stripe and a small white "R" logo on the side or white with a center red stripe and a small red "R" logo on the side (as in the previous season). Both styles were in use concurrently. Rutgers used an almost identical version of the red helmet this season.

1967-72: Logo was a white "R" inside a black football-shaped oval. The helmet was either red with a center white stripe between two black stripes, or white with a center red stripe between two black stripes. Both red and white helmets were in use concurrently. Albany and Penn used similar oval

logos in this era, as did Brigham Young into the 1990s.

1973-81: The white helmet used in the previous six seasons became the standard helmet, as the red version was abandoned. No predominantly red helmet has been used by RPI since 1972.

1970s Variant: White with a center red stripe between two black stripes. This design was essentially the same as the other helmets in use at this time, minus the black oval logo. Photographs exist showing this version, plus the red and white black-oval helmets, all in use concurrently.

1982-83: White with a center red

stripe, with a large "R" logo in red on the side.

1984-88: White with the "bullet" logo in red on the side. This is the only RPI helmet design that was so unique (because of the logo) it could not be mistaken for any other school's helmet.

Since 1989: White with a center red stripe with the player's number in red on the side. With the 2004 season this becomes the longest-lasting helmet design in school history.
