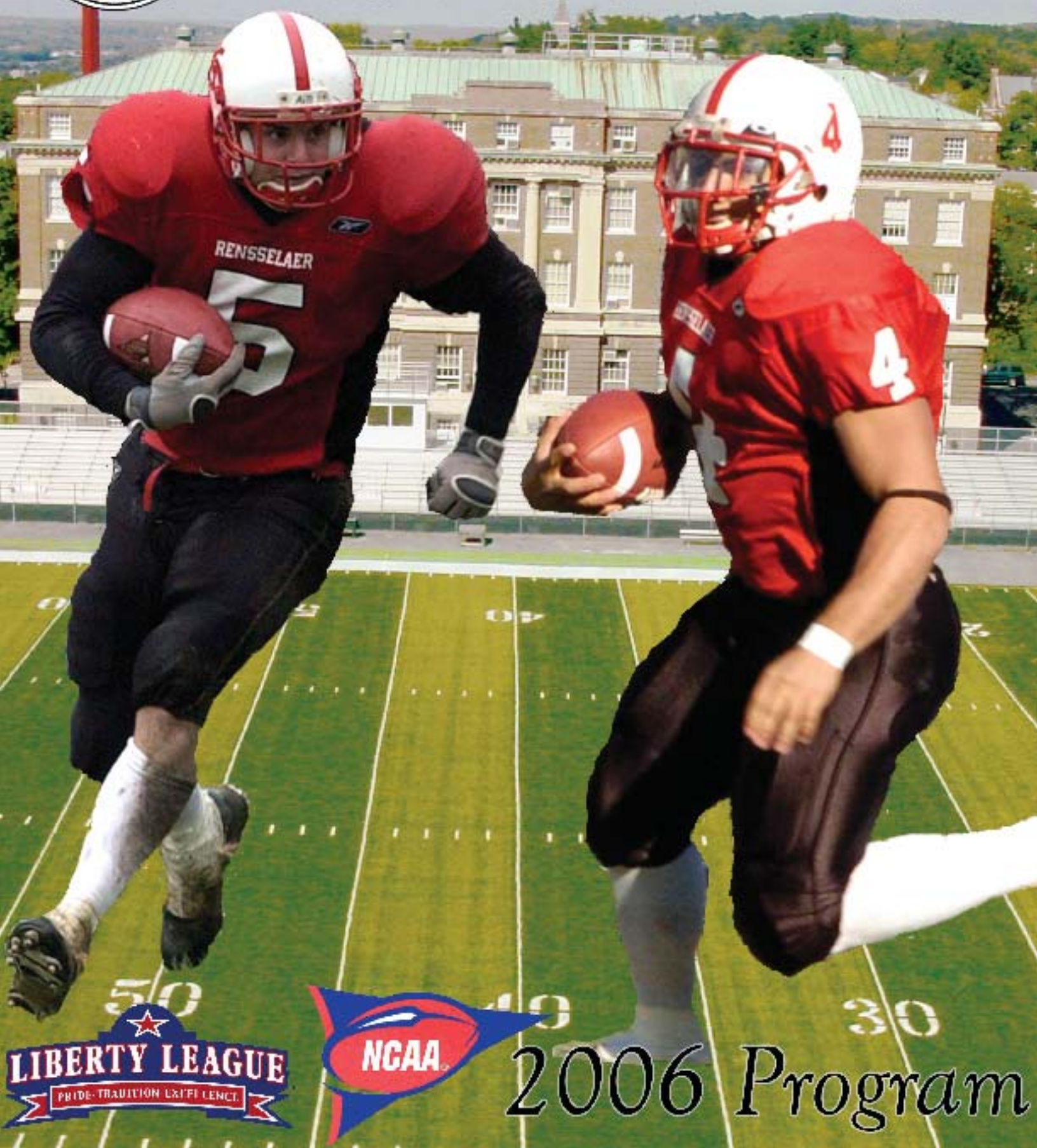

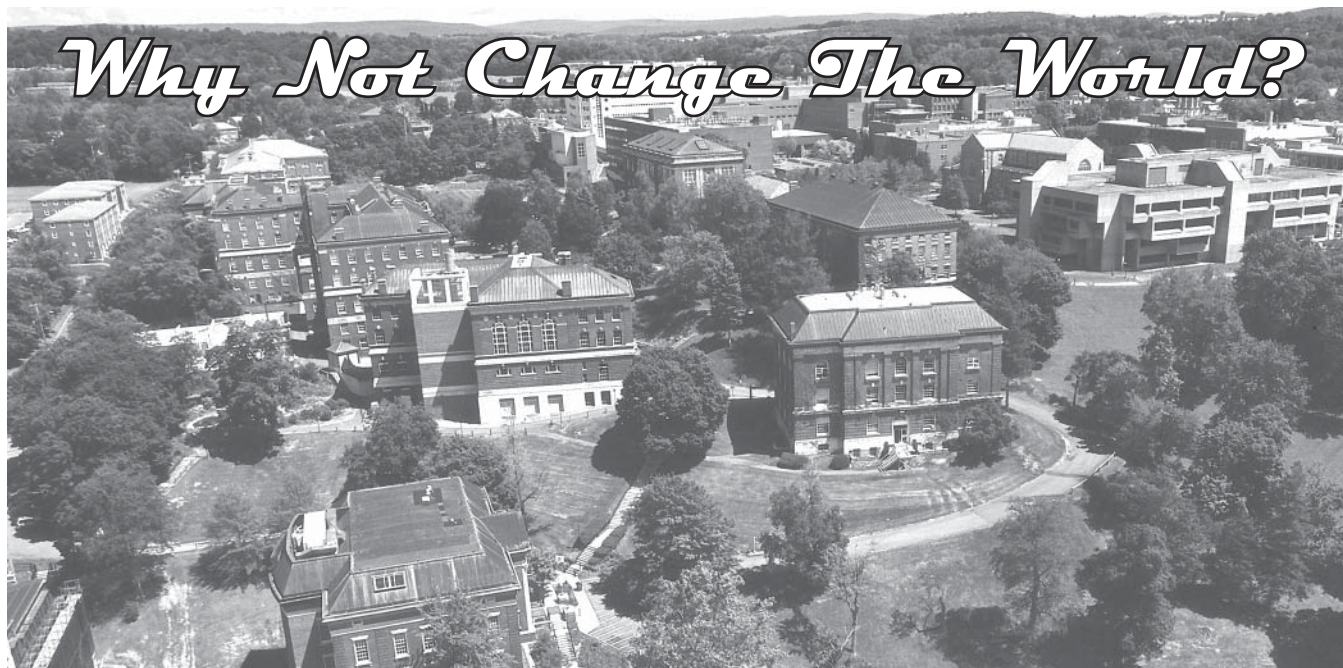

Dr. Shirley Ann Jackson President

Dr. Shirley Ann Jackson is President of Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute.

She is immediate past President of the American Association for the



Advancement of Science (2004) and chairman of the AAAS Board of Directors, a member of the National Academy of Engineering (NAE), and the Council on Foreign Relations, a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the American Physical Society, the Smithsonian Institution, and serves on the New York Stock Exchange Board of Directors. She is the former Chairman of the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC).

U.S. News & World Report has ranked Rensselaer 42nd among the nation's top universities, up from 43rd last year. The Institute also ranks 24th in the "Best Values" among national universities, up from 27th last year. Rensselaer's School of Engineering is ranked 19th in the nation.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS KEN RALPH



Ken Ralph was named director of athletics at Rensselaer on May 30, 2002.

At RPI, Ralph oversees the Institute's 23 NCAA intercollegiate varsity teams – 11 of which are women's – and numerous junior varsity squads, involving more than 600 student-athletes. Two sports – men's and women's ice hockey – compete at the Division I level while the other three are Division III programs.

In his four years since joining the Institute, Ralph has worked tirelessly for the betterment of the student-athletes and the university.

This past season, Rensselaer saw two teams and seven individuals compete in NCAA Championships while two other teams captured ECAC Championships. Eleven student-athletes earned 15 National All-American citations, including individuals from football, track & field, diving, baseball, softball, and lacrosse. RPI also boasted seven National Academic All-Americans – which ranked second in all of Division III – and the field hockey team posted the highest team grade point average in the nation for the second straight season.

The 2004-05 season saw Rensselaer produce 11 National All-Americans and seven Academic All-Americans, which was one shy of its NCAA Division III-best eight selected in 2003-04. In fact, Rensselaer ranked second in the entire nation in Academic All-Americans across all NCAA divisions, trailing only the University of Nebraska and tying Rice University.

In 2003-04, Rensselaer was represented at eight NCAA Championships, including a tournament semi-final appearance by the football team – the first in school history – a regional tournament berth by the baseball team. Individually, RPI sent 14 representatives to national competitions, including one who became the school's first-ever national champion in swimming, as well as four others who finished in the top four in their respective events. Overall, Rensselaer had 18 student-athletes combine for 29 National All-American honors.

Ralph's numerous other accomplishments since being hired include playing an integral role in the passing of NCAA Amendment 65-1, which maintained athletic scholarships for a select number of Division III Institutions, including RPI and its Division I men's hockey team, and the elevation of the women's ice hockey program from Division III to Division I. He also initiated the Annual Black Friday men's hockey game, started the Hockey Ring of Honor and organized the 50th Anniversary Reunion and Celebration Weekend to commemorate the school's 1954 National Championship men's hockey team as well as the 20th Anniversary Celebration of the 1985

men's hockey national championship team. Ralph also oversaw the resurfacing of the Ned Harkness Track & Field and has served on numerous committees with the Liberty League as well as the ECAC Hockey League.

Prior to joining Rensselaer, Ralph was senior assistant athletic director at Connecticut College in New London, Conn., where he oversaw a 26-team Division III department and directed The Lott Natatorium. He headed athletic program development, was the NCAA compliance officer and supervised the coaching staff and sports information office. He also served as a member of the Athletic Director's Advisory Committee and the Athletic Management Committee.

In addition, Ralph served as head swim coach of both the men's and women's programs, compiling a 50-33 record (101-72-1 in his coaching career). During his tenure, which began in 1998, every one of his teams earned National All-Academic status from the College Swim Coaches Association of America, maintaining a team average grade point average of 3.41. Ralph, who also coached water polo, earned the 2000 Andrew Chait Award for outstanding service to Connecticut College and its athletic department.

Ralph began his head coaching career in 1992 at Georgetown University, where his men's and women's swim teams broke 17 school records in two years. He became head coach at Kutztown University in 1994 and produced nine All-Americans in 1996. Both the men's and women's teams finished among the nation's top 12 and broke a total of 32 records over two seasons. Ralph was chosen as the 1996 Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Coach of the Year. Later that year, he moved to the Air Force Academy, where both swim teams earned National All-Academic status with a team GPA of at least 3.2. While at Air Force, Ralph earned the Moyer-Nike Award for Excellence in Coaching Women in 1996 and the Air Force Award for Organizational Excellence in 1997.

A native of Salem, N.H., Ralph is a graduate of the University of Alaska-Anchorage with a degree in political science. He was a five-time NCAA Division II All-American in swimming (in 1989 in the 100- and 200-yard butterfly and in 1990 in the 100-yard butterfly and 100- and 200-yard backstroke) and went on to become a U.S. Senior National Qualifier in 1989 and 1990. He is a member of the Alaska-Anchorage Athletic Hall of Fame.

Ralph's community service activities have leveraged his athletic experiences. He participated in Camp Rotary, an academic and recreational camp for disadvantaged students in New London, and he was a mentor in the Connecticut College Office of Volunteers for Community Service. He has also been a volunteer for many associations and has hosted the "Match" program with Big Brother/Big Sisters.

Ralph, who was Rensselaer's 2003-04 Person of the Year by *The Polytechnic*, and his wife, Mary, reside in Ballston Lake.

ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS KAREN HANSEN



Karen Hansen is in her second year as associate athletic director. Among her duties in this role are handling the business and finance operations for the athletic department.

Hansen came to Rensselaer from Bloomsburg University in Bloomsburg, Pa., where she was the director of athletic operations. Her duties included game scheduling for all 18 varsity sports, liaison between all athletic support staff members, game setup for all home athletic contests and post-season tournaments, and overseeing a student work-study

staff of 25 that served as event workers and weight room monitors. She was also responsible for maintaining financial databases for summer camps, work-study budgets, sport-specific attendance records, transportation, and other programs on campus.

In 1999, Hansen worked for *The Pocono Record* in Stroudsburg, Pa., where she compiled local sports agate into articles and wrote features on area athletes, coaches and sports administrators. She also worked that year with the

Lehigh Valley Steam professional soccer team in Easton, Pa., serving as the event management, promotions and marketing Intern. Her responsibilities included writing field usage proposals, stadium setup for game-day operations, obtaining corporate sponsorships, and setup of community clinics.

Hansen is a 2000 graduate of East Stroudsburg University in Pennsylvania with a master's degree in sports management and administration. She received her bachelor's degree in physical education from East Stroudsburg in 1997.

THE 2006 SEASON OUTLOOK

With 18 starters returning – including all 11 on offense – from a squad that posted an 8-2 record and captured the ECAC Northwest Bowl, the 2006 Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute football team has reason to be optimistic for a successful season. The Engineers, who also return the core of their coaching staff, are gunning for their fifth post-season appearance in the last six years and their sixth in the last eight years.

The 2005 campaign featured many highlights for RPI, which came within two touchdowns of its third undefeated regular season since 1999. Offensively, the team averaged 33.5 points and 429.1 yards per game behind the emergence of quarterback Jimmy Robertson (Yonkers, NY/Iona Prep) and standout performances from All-Americans Jay Bernardo (East Greenbush, NY/LaSalle Institute), a running back, and Jon Branche (Schenectady, NY/Colonie), a tight end,

as well as the offensive line. Defensively, the Engineers held the opposition to under 20 points (18.9) and just over 300 yards (305.9) per game.

THE OFFENSE

Once again this year 18th-year head coach Joe King hopes to achieve a solid balance on offense. Rensselaer is coming off a season in which it ran the ball 405 times for a net 1,816 yards while throwing it 355 times for 2,475 yards. Nineteen of the team's touchdowns came on the ground while 26 were through the air.

A 6-1, 190-pound sophomore, Robertson saw action in nine of ten games at QUARTERBACK last season, including nine as a starter. The Liberty League Rookie of the Year, he completed 193-of-325 passes for 2,313 yards, with a league-

best 26 touchdowns and only eight interceptions. He led the league in pass efficiency (140.6) while also running for 133 yards to rank first in the Liberty League in total offense (271.8 yards per game).

Senior Frank Catellier (Voorheesville, NY/Voorheesville) and junior Josh Chiappone (Troy, NY/Troy) are also capable of solid play under center. Catellier has gotten into 18 games during his career, including eight as a starter, while Chiappone played in four contests last season.

The quarterbacks have each of their top six RECEIVERS back, among them a pair of All-Liberty League performers, and all of whom caught at least 11 passes. Junior Brendan McGowan (Mesa, AZ/Mountain View) led the team with 66 receptions for 799 yards and nine touchdowns, followed closely by the 6-4, 245-pound Branche, a captain who had 65 catches for 919 yards. A senior who was a multiple National All-American for the second straight year, as well as an ESPN the Magazine National Academic All-American, Branche averaged 14.1 yards per catch, 91.9 yards per game and 14 touchdowns – all team highs.

Bernardo was third on the team with 24 receptions for 201 yards, followed by junior Drew Utschig (Harrison, NY/Iona Prep), who caught 19 passes for 173 yards. Sophomore Eren Savasli (Brooklyn, NY/Brooklyn Tech) had 18 catches, including two touchdowns, for 209 yards while junior Chris Graef (Bethel, CT/Bethel) made 11 receptions for 144 yards in six contests. Senior Graham Boyd (Wappingers Falls, NY/John Jay), who is also an outstanding special teams player, continues to add depth to the position.

While Bernardo, a second-year captain, showed he has the hands to catch the ball, his primary role will once again be as a runner out of the BACKFIELD. The 5-7, 190-pound senior rushed 256 times for 1,422 yards and 19 touchdowns last season. His 142.2 yards per game average ranked eighth in the nation, while his 11.4 points per game was sixth. The Most Outstanding Player of the ECAC Northwest Bowl and a National All-American, Bernardo was also among the top 20 nationally in all purpose yards per game with 162.3 (17th). Among his top efforts was an NCAA record 99-yard run in the first game of last season.

Also expected to see playing time in the backfield are sophomores Mike Giacoia (Marlboro, NY/Marlboro), a tailback, and Justin Heafy (Cheshire, CT/Cheshire), a fullback. Giacoia

rushed for 90 yards on 21 attempts, including a 25-yard long, while Heafy served as a blocking back. Junior Nick Casale (Waterford, NY/LaSalle Institute), who's primary role is as a defensive lineman, also played some fullback.

Opening holes for the running backs and providing protection for the quarterbacks is an OFFENSIVE LINE that returns all five starters, including four seniors. All five have started for at least one season and two are coming off All-Liberty League performances. At tackle is

fourth-year starter Jake Russell (Washington, NJ/Warren Hills), an All-League and All-ECAC selection a year ago, on the left and classmate Shawn Herrmann (Phoenix, NY/C.W. Baker) on the right. Herrmann, a National Academic All-American as a junior, is a captain and third-year starter. The guards are senior Matt Mellow (Keene, NH/Keene) on the left and Terrence Bynum (Brooklyn, NY/Lincoln), an All-League and All-Region choice as a junior, on the right. Junior Danny Caruso (Valley Stream, NY/Holy Trinity) returns as the center. A starter in the first five games, he missed the final half of last season due to injury.

Also playing key roles on the offensive line will be juniors Dave Dillen (Grand Island, NY/Grand Island), Dave Lutian (Milford, CT/Jonathan Law) and Grant Sanville (Westfield, VT/North Country). All three are versatile players who saw action on the varsity and the junior varsity as sophomores.

THE DEFENSE

On the opposite side of the ball, the Engineers feature a solid group of down linemen, a young set of linebackers and a secondary that returns three of four starters.

Among those playing IN THE TRENCHES are five players who played significantly last year, including two starters. Fourth-year varsity performer Bob Perreault (Troy, NY/Lansingburgh) registered 36 tackles from his right end position, including 17 solo stops and seven for lost yards (51). He also had a team-high six sacks for 43 yards lost while also forcing a fumble. Junior tackle Doug Ingraham (Grand Island, NY/Grand Island) is the other returning starter. He finished with 29 tackles, including 18 unassisted, 6.5 for lost yards (30) and four sacks (25 yards lost) in his first year on the defensive line.

Casale, an end who had 16 tackles (4 solos) with three sacks (20 yards lost), and sophomore tackle Khaly Merot (White Plains, NY/White Plains), who recorded nine tackles (3 solos) with two sacks (9 yards lost), played extensively on the second unit along with junior Vince Scicchitano (Centerport, NY/Harborfields). A third-year varsity performer at nose guard, Scicchitano made 13 tackles as a sophomore.

Among those competing for playing time are sophomores James McLaughlin (Foxboro, MA/Foxboro) and Ben Williams (Clifton Park, NY/Shenendehowa) and senior Mike Warner (Lafayette Hill, PA/Plymouth Whitmarsh).

The most noteworthy changes for Rensselaer are at LINEBACKER, where one of the three starters return. Senior captain Armin Warner (Schenectady, NY/Schenectady) is that lone returnee, bringing with him 57 tackles, including 34 unassisted, 4.5 for lost yards (21), three sacks (18 yards lost) and two pass breakups. Junior Tom Rayhill (Grand Island, NY/Grand Island), who is also a standout special teams performer, is the top returning tackler, having registered 58 stops. He had 30 solos, 7.5 for lost yards (25), three sacks (18 yards lost), an interception, three pass breakups, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. Nick Foglia (Watervliet, NY/CBA), a senior, has an opportunity to move into a starting role.

Junior Dan Belber (Niskayuna, NY/Niskayuna), who played his first two seasons as a defensive lineman, senior Kevin Jordan (Bluffton, SC/Niskayuna, NY), a converted defensive back, and fellow senior Dave Pompei (Burnt Hills, NY/Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake) will compete for time while also providing depth.

In RPI's SECONDARY both starting cornerbacks return along with the free safety. On one corner is senior Adam LoGiudice (Massapequa, NY/Massapequa) while junior John Tesiero (Amsterdam, NY/Amsterdam), a captain,

patrols the other side. LoGiudice was All-Liberty League after making 36 tackles (26 solos) with six pass breakups and a team-high four interceptions in 2005 while Tesiero made 42 tackles, including 28 unassisted. He also had five pass breakups and an interception with a 20-yard return. Sophomore Mark Sangiorgi (Wyckoff, NJ/Ramapo) is the third starter back. He finished his rookie campaign with 40 tackles (18 solos), a fumble recovery, an interception and a team-best eight pass breakups.

Senior Brett Perron (Windham, NH/Central Catholic), who is in his third varsity season, and sophomore Sean McDaniel (Rome, NY/Rome Free Academy) played reserve roles last year and should see more time this season. Perron finished with nine tackles (6 solos) while McDaniel had an unassisted stop.

THE SPECIAL TEAMS

Rensselaer's KICKING is expected to be solid as a pair of veterans return. Senior Drew Taranto (Baldwinsville, NY/C.W. Baker) made 4-of-5 field goals, including a long of 33, and 20-of-24 PATs, while classmate Brett Kebea (East Greenbush, NY/Columbia) also has varsity experience. Taranto also returns to handle kick-off duties. On the other side, the Engineers will have a first-year PUNTER.

Handling the RETURN duties will be LoGiudice, an All-Liberty League First Team selection after bringing back 30 punts for 222 yards and 23 kickoffs for 581 yards - all school single season records. Tesiero and Jordan may also see time as returners.

THE COACHES

King, Rensselaer's winningest FOOTBALL COACH of all time, has a 118-44-2 record for a .725 winning percentage, making him the most successful football coach in terms of wins and winning percentage in the 119-year history of the school's program. Over the past 14 seasons, he has a combined 104-33 (.759) mark, including two perfect regular seasons (9-0 in 1999, 8-0 in 2001), four league championships (1997, 1998, 1999, 2001), six ECAC Bowl appearances (1992, 1993, 1995, 1997, 2002, 2005) - all wins - and three NCAA Playoff appearances (1999, 2001, 2003).

Among the assistant coaches returning are both COORDINATORS. Pat DelMonaco, the offensive coordinator who also serves as the offensive line coach, is back for his fourth season while Chad Martinovich, the defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach, returns for his third campaign. In addition, five other ASSISTANT COACHES return to the sidelines while four new aides have been added.

THE SCHEDULE

Rensselaer opens the 2006 SEASON with two non-league road games. The Engineers make their season debut on September 9 at Endicott (12pm) before traveling to Utica on September 16 (1:30pm).

RPI kicks off its six-game Liberty League schedule - and its home slate - on September 23 when it hosts Hobart in a key league matchup beginning at 1pm. Becker visits '86 Field for the first meeting between the two schools, a non-league affair, on September 30 (1pm) before the Engineers travel to St. Lawrence on October 7 and Merchant Marine on October 21. Both games, which are league contests, begin at 1pm.

The final three weeks of the year has RPI hosting WPI in the Transit Trophy Game on October 28 (1pm), at Rochester on November 4 (12pm) and home against Union for the Dutchman Shoes Trophy Game and Senior Day in the regular season finale on November 11 (1pm).

HEAD COACH JOE KING



Rensselaer's winningest head football coach of all time, Joe King returns to the sidelines of '86 Field for his 18th season at the helm.

During his tenure, King has taken the program, which began in 1886, to new heights. In his 17 years he has compiled a 118-44-2

record for a .726 winning percentage, making him the most successful football coach in terms of wins and winning percentage in the 119-year history of Rensselaer football.

Over the past 14 seasons, King has a combined 104-33 (.759) mark, including two perfect regular seasons (9-0 in 1999, 8-0 in 2001), four League Championships (1997, 1998, 1999, 2001), six Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Championship Game appearances (1992, 1993, 1995, 1997, 2002, 2005) - all wins - and three NCAA Playoff appearances (1999, 2001, 2003).

In 2003, King led the Engineers to a school-record 11 wins (11-2) and a spot in the Division III National Semi-Finals for the first time in school history. It was RPI's third NCAA Tournament appearance - and fourth trip to the post-season - in the past five years. Among the team's 11 victories were wins in all three of its Trophy Games and the school's first NCAA Tournament win. The Engineers ranked among the leaders in the nation in numerous statistical categories and established more than 50 school records. In the final



national rankings, Rensselaer was listed in the top ten in every poll and was recognized as the ECAC Division III Upstate Team of the Year. RPI was also the recipient of the prestigious Division III Lambert Meadowlands Team of the Year Award. Five players earned All-American recognition and King and his staff were honored as the league's Coaching Staff of the Year. In addition, King was selected as the East Region Coach of the Year, the Division III Coach of the Year by Schutt Sports, and Rensselaer's Coach of the Year, as selected by the school's coaching staff.

In 2002, the Engineers finished 8-2 overall, including wins in the Shot Glass Trophy Game against Coast Guard, the Transit Trophy Game against WPI and the ECAC Northeast Championship Game at Worcester St.

The 2001 season marked the second time in the past three the Engineers posted an undefeated regular season (8-0) and were selected to the 28-team NCAA Tournament that determines the Division III National Champion. Rensselaer, which won its fourth league title in the past five years that season, was the top seed in the East Region and played in the second round for the first time in history.

In 1999, the Engineers won their third straight league title while compiling a perfect regular season (9-0) on their way to being invited to the NCAA Playoffs for the first time in school history. In addition, the team climbed to the highest rankings ever at that time in two national polls. RPI also led the entire nation in turnover margin, ranked third in scoring defense, sixth in pass efficiency defense, and seventh in rushing defense.

King, a four-time league Coach of the Year, also led the Engineers to a tremendous campaign in 1997 when Rensselaer was 9-1, including a nine-game winning streak. The only loss came in overtime to eventual NCAA qualifier Coast Guard in the season opener. Rensselaer was ranked as high as fifth in the NCAA Regional rankings and went on to win its fourth ECAC title in six years. King and his assistants not only earned league Staff of the Year honors but they also won the ECAC Upstate New York award.

Since King took over the reigns in 1989 more than 30 pre-season All-Americans, 15 post-season All-Americans (including Rensselaer's first American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) First Team All-American in 1996) and many All-Region and All-Conference honorees have worn the RPI uniform. Additionally, all seven of the school's First Team National Academic All-Americans have suited up for King. Under his tutelage, the Engineers have tied or set almost every school record.

A native of nearby Ballston Spa, N.Y., King is accustomed to winning, not only in college but also at the high school level, earning an impres-

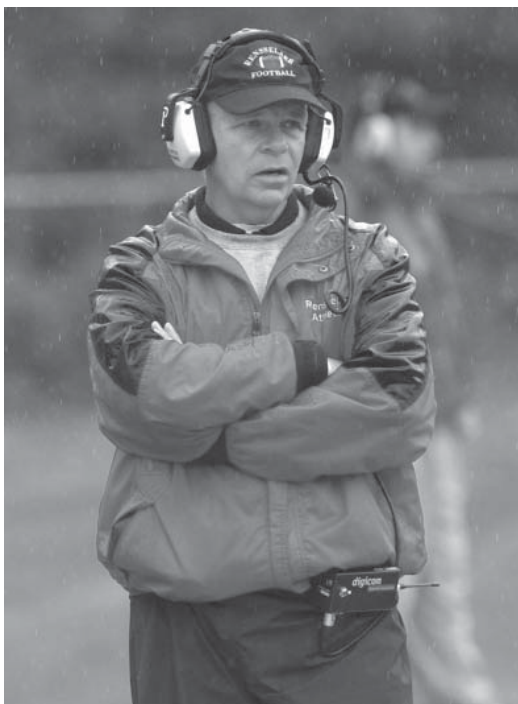

sive 52-23-3 (.686) record. He began his coaching career at St. Peter's High School in Saratoga Springs, N.Y., where he served as athletic director, football coach and baseball coach. He turned around a football program that had not claimed a single win in the previous five seasons. In his second year, King led St. Peter's to a 7-1 record, as well as to ninth place in the New York State rankings. He also led the baseball team to the Parochial League Championship in his two seasons as head coach.

After two years at St. Peter's, King went on to Watervliet High School, where he inherited a program that had only one winning season in 23 years. In his seven years with the Cannoneers, he compiled a 44-16-2 (.726) mark. He guided the team to six winning seasons, including 1979 when it went 8-0-1 and won the Section 2 Class C title. While at Watervliet, King, who also taught social studies, was named the Troy Area



High School Coach of the Year by *The Record* four times and the Capitaland High School Coach of the Year once by the *Times Union*. Among the players he mentored was Tim Sherwin, who went on to have a standout career as a tight end with the Baltimore Colts and the New York Giants in the National Football League.

King, who was named the 2002 Rensselaer Person of the Year by the staff of *The Polytechnic*, the student newspaper, as well as the Coach of the Year by the Institute's coaching staff, arrived at Rensselaer in 1981,

spending his first five seasons as an assistant coach. He then enjoyed a three-year stint as associate head coach before being appointed head coach in 1989.

In addition to his duties as head football coach, King also serves as an assistant athletic director, a position he has held for the past six years. Among his duties in that role are handling the athletic department's internship program, coordinating game-day management and heading the department's safety issues and concerns. He has also been the head track & field coach.

A 1970 graduate of Siena College with a bachelor's degree in history, King played football and baseball as an undergraduate.

He and his wife, Gail, make their home in Saratoga Springs. They have two grown sons, Joe and Kevin, who is an assistant with the Engineers.

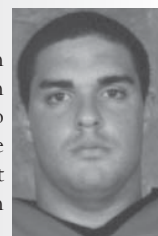

THE ASSISTANT COACHES



PAT DELMONACO

**Offensive Coordinator
& Offensive Line**

Pasquale "Pat" DelMonaco, Jr. joined the Rensselaer football staff in 2003, serving as the offensive line coach. In addition, he is in his second year as the program's offensive coordinator and third as the recruiting coordinator.

In the 2005 season, DelMonaco's offense led the Liberty League in scoring (33.5 points per game) behind the league Rookie of the Year, quarterback Jimmy Robertson. Narrowly missing a spot in the NCAA Tournament, the Engineers were selected for the ECAC Northwest Bowl and defeated St. John Fisher in the Northwest Bowl.

During DelMonaco's first two seasons, the Engineers averaged over 5.7 yards per play and more than 425 yards per contest, including 281 passing. The team rushed for over 100 yards in 12 of 21 games and over 200 yards five times while Rensselaer's quarterbacks threw for over 300 yards nine times and over 400 yards on four occasions.

DelMonaco, whose offensive line allowed only six sacks in 2004, joined the Engineers from Hudson Valley Community College, where he coached the offensive line in his first two years and the quarterbacks in his third and final season. Between his second and third year with the Vikings, he was a graduate assistant with the offensive line at the University of Illinois.

As a player, the Sleepy Hollow, N.Y., native played center at the University at Albany from 1996 to 2000, captaining the team as a senior. During his four years, the Great Danes posted a 35-7 overall record and won two Eastern Football Conference Championships (1997, 1998).

DelMonaco, who earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in history in 2000, resides in Niskayuna with his wife, Kelly, and their daughter, Julia.

After spending three seasons as the Engineers starting quarterback, Dan Cole is in his third year as the quarterbacks coach for Rensselaer.

As a player, Cole set nearly every school passing record, completing 671-of-1,202 passes for 8,902 yards and 87 touchdowns in 32 games. He averaged

277.1 yards per game while throwing only 26 interceptions. The Albany, N.Y., native also ran 333 times for 823 yards and 13 touchdowns.

As a senior, Cole threw for 3,679 yards, 40 touchdowns and just 11 interceptions in 13 games, leading the Engineers to a school-record 11 wins (11-2) and the NCAA National Semi-Finals. The Liberty League Offensive Performer of the Week four times, he also ran for 276 yards and two touchdowns. He was voted the Offensive Player of the Year by the Liberty League and the ECAC and was a multiple National All-American. He went on to a tryout with the NFL's New England Patriots and in the CFL.

Cole, the team's Offensive Most Valuable Player three times during his career, graduated in 2004 with an EMAC degree.



PETE COSTANZA

Defensive Backs

Pete Costanza is in his first season coaching at Rensselaer.

A New Jersey native, he is the head coach of the Albany Conquest of AF2. Among his responsibilities with the Conquest are all day-to-day football operations, player signings and recruiting, and coordinating the game plans for both the offense and defense.

Costanza has extensive experience in AF2, including as the head coach and offensive coordinator of the Columbus Wardogs, the offensive coordinator of the Iowa Barnstormers, offensive coordinator of the Norfolk Nighthawks and assistant head coach and offensive coordinator of the Roanoke Steam. He has also been an assistant coach with the New Jersey Red Dogs of the Arena Football League.

An outstanding linebacker and defensive end for four years for the Engineers, he notched 222 career tackles, including a team-leading 111 in 1988. Offensive Line

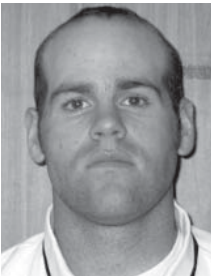
Bob Schoonmaker is in his fourth season with the Engineers and first with the offensive line. He spent the first three seasons coaching the tight ends.

Schoonmaker spent eight years as the head coach at Granville Central School, where he led the team to the 1995 Division Championship – its first since 1981 – and was named Coach of the Year by the *Greenwich Journal Press*.

He started coaching in 1992 as the defensive coordinator for Whitehall Central School, where his unit was not scored upon in five consecutive games during the 1993 season.

A four-year inside linebacker and tight end under Joe King at Watervliet High School, Schoonmaker was a member of the Canoneers' 1979 undefeated Colonial Council and Section 2 Class C Championship team, earning numerous honors, including All-State recognition.

Schoonmaker, who attended Hudson Valley Community College and Adirondack Community College, resides in Granville, with his wife of 19 years, Dorie, and two daughters, Rachel and Renee.



KEVIN KING

Inside Linebackers

Kevin King is in his third season of his second stint as a coach for the Engineers, having also served as the team's intern. For the second straight year, he will coach the linebackers and assist with special teams.

GAME 1: SEPTEMBER 10

Rensselaer 34, Endicott 7

Troy, N.Y.

Jay Bernardo rushed for 249 yards and four touchdowns, including an NCAA record 99-yarder, to lead the Engineers to a 34-7 victory over Endicott in a non-league game at '86 Field. With the win, RPI began the season 1-0 while the Gulls fell to 0-2.

A junior, Bernardo carried 32 times, scoring on runs of two, one, three and 99 yards. In addition to tying the NCAA record, he also matched RPI's record, originally set by Don Patria in 1981. Bernardo, who also caught three passes for 23 yards, opened the scoring in the first quarter when he capped a five-play, 30-yard drive with a two-yard plunge. The extra point failed and Rensselaer led 6-0 after one quarter.

Bernardo added to RPI's lead with his second touchdown, this time from one yard out at 6:57 of the second quarter. A successful two-point conversion pass from

Frank Catellier to Brendan McGowan put the home team ahead 14-0. Endicott wasted little time responding, going 68 yards on seven plays to pull within seven points with 4:08 left in the first half. Junior running back Gerard Festa scored on an eight-yard run to the right side and Adam Maher added the extra point.

Rensselaer pulled away with three second half touchdowns. Catellier, a junior, connected with freshman wide receiver Eren Savasli from 36 yards out for a 21-7 lead at 6:23 of the third quarter before Bernardo scored two more touchdowns in the fourth. He ran from three yards out at 13:40 to cap a six-play, 62-yard drive and he broke free for 99 yards at the 8:23 mark. Junior Brett Kebea added the extra points on two touchdowns for the final score.

Catellier finished with 141 yards, a touchdown, and two interceptions on 13-of-22 passing. He also ran five times for 67 yards, including a 54-yard long. Savasli had two receptions for 58 yards. As a team, Rensselaer finished with 465 yards of total offense to Endicott's 206.

Defensively, sophomore John Tesiero had eight tackles, including six unassisted and one for a loss (1 yard), and senior Tim Frame had eight stops (5 solos) and a pass breakup.

For Endicott, junior Jeff Trinquet rushed 12 times for a team-high 57 yards while Festa ran for 44 yards and a touchdown on 16 carries. Vinny Orlando and Alex Smith combined for 88 yards with an interception on 7-of-21 passing.

Jared Giblin and TJ Sawyer each had six tackles to pace the defense. Giblin had four solos while Sawyer had three unassisted, one for a loss (3 yards), a forced fumble and a pass breakup.

Rensselaer enjoyed a balanced offensive effort and a solid defensive performance to defeat Utica, 41-10, in a non-league game at '86 Field. The Engineers, who improved to 2-0, rushed for 215 yards and passed for 259 while holding the Pioneers to 170 yards of total offense. With the loss, Utica fell to 2-1.

Running back Jay Bernardo and quarterback Jimmy Robertson led Rensselaer's offensive attack. The Engineers added six points when Robertson hit junior tight end Jon Branche for a 34-yard touchdown as the first quarter expired. The extra point was missed and RPI led, 13-6, after one.

Rensselaer increased its lead to 20-3 when Bernardo capped a seven-play, 30-yard drive with a four-yard touchdown run with 3:24 left in the second quarter.

RPI exploded for 21 points in the third quarter to go ahead, 41-3. McGowan caught a 16-yarder from Rob-

ertson with 9:32 left before Bernardo scored twice within a minute late in the stanza to close out Rensselaer's scoring.

Defensively for the Engineers, which held Utica to just 40 yards rushing, sophomore linebacker Tom Rayhill had seven tackles, including four solos and a nine-yard sack, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. Linebacker Jimmy Motzkin, a graduate student, added a team-high eight tackles, all assisted.

Hobart 56, Rensselaer 48 3OT

Hobart outlasted visiting Rensselaer 56-48 in triple overtime in the longest game in both team's histories. Statesmen junior quarterback Shawn Mizro threw for 290 yards and tied his own single game record with five touchdown passes.

In the third overtime, the Statesmen, who played offense first, scored on fourth and goal from the 1-yard line on a run over left tackle by junior Doug Blakowski and then converted a two-point pass.

When RPI (2-1, 0-1 Liberty) tried to answer, Hobart (3-0, 1-0) came with intense pressure, hurrying freshman quarterback Jimmy Robertson on three of the Engineers' four plays, all incompletions. Robertson finished the day 28-of-54 for 394 yards with five touchdowns and one interception.

The Statesmen charged out to a 24-0 lead. Fullback Chris Whipple opened the scoring on a 4-yard reception from Mizro for the only points of the first quarter.

Early in the second quarter, Blakowski scored from 23 yards out to put Hobart up 14-0. Kicker Kevin Olson followed that up with a 29-yard field goal at the 5:51 mark. Mizro completed the run with a 30-yard toss to James Wright.

The Engineers broke through the Hobart defense, which did not allow a point in the season's first nine quarters, when junior tight end Jon Branche hauled in a pass that was over the head of its intended receiver, but nonetheless went for 48 yards and the score. The point after try hit the upright.

In the third quarter, Branche hoisted his team on his back, scoring from 12 yards, 29 yards, and 26 yards out. He finished with 12 catches for 217 yards and a record five touchdowns.

Meanwhile, Hobart continued to put points up, scoring on a 47-yard Olson field goal and an 18-yard pass play.

Hobart's lead dwindled to just eight points to start the fourth quarter. In the fourth frame, RPI missed field goals from 31 yards and 41 yards, but equalized with 5:27 remaining in regulation. Tailback Jay Bernardo capped a 12-play, 53-yard drive with a 1-yard plunge on fourth and goal. Bernardo finished with 122 yards rushing and two TDs.

The two teams combined for 1,019 yards of total offense and 14 touchdowns.

Defensively, RPI graduate student linebacker Jimmy Motzkin led all tacklers with 14, including two sacks.

Jay Bernardo carried 29 times for 146 yards and he also recovered a fumble for a touchdown, leading Rensselaer (3-1 overall; 1-1 Liberty) to a 17-3 Liberty League win over Coast Guard (2-2; 0-2) as the Engineers retained the Shot Glass Trophy in the 70th and possible final meeting between the two teams.

RPI scored the only points of the first half on the opening possession of the game as Jimmy Robertson (15-of-31 for 194 yards, TD, INT) threw a 16-yard touchdown to Jon Branche (5 catches, 90 yards) capping a 7-play, 65-yard drive. Bernardo had 35 yards on the drive as RPI led 7-0 with 11:27 left in the first quarter.

On its first possession, Coast Guard drove to the RPI 17 before Lance Lynch fumbled at the 14-yard line on a 2nd-and-five.

Coast Guard had a chance to get on the board early in the second quarter, but a 34-yard field goal attempt by David Lieberman was blocked by Graham Boyd with 13:48 left in the second quarter.

Following a pair of punts by each team, RPI took over at its own 38-yard line with 4:07 left and drove down to the Coast Guard 11. Bernardo fumbled on fourth-and-one, but Branche recovered at the five for a first down. However, the Bears' Justin Andrews intercepted Robertson in the end zone with nine seconds left on the next play to keep the score at 7-0 at halftime.

Coast Guard used a 10-play, 49-yard drive capped by a Lieberman 29-yard field goal on the opening drive of the second half to cut the lead to 7-3 with 12:21 remaining in the third quarter.

On its first possession of the second half, RPI answered with a 12-play, 71-yard drive which ended with Robertson fumbling near the goal line, but Bernardo falling on it in the end zone for a 14-3 lead with 8:23 left in the third quarter.

Coast Guard drove to the RPI 34, but turned it over after a 4th-and-19 pass was incomplete with 11:17 left in the game.

The Engineers and Bears, who are moving to the NEFC, are no longer on each other's schedules.

Rensselaer got three touchdown passes from Jimmy Robertson to Jon Branche and 186 yards and two touchdowns from running back Jay Bernardo to defeat St. Lawrence, 35-13, in a constant downpour at '86 Field. With the victory, Rensselaer improved to 4-1 overall and 2-1 in the Liberty League. The Saints fell to 2-3 and 1-2.

St. Lawrence jumped out to a quick lead when it marched down the field on the game's first possession. The drive, which covered eight plays and 85 yards, was culminated with a 21-yard touchdown pass down the middle of the field from junior quarterback Matt Bezio to sophomore wide receiver Mike O'Donnell at 12:52 of the opening quarter. Rensselaer answered six minutes later when Robertson, a freshman, found Branche, a junior tight end, from seven yards out.

A two-point conversion pass from Brendan McGowan to Adam Van Horn made it 21-7 in favor of the home team. The score came one play after RPI's Tim Frame recovered a St. Lawrence fumble.

Bernardo, a junior, put RPI on the board for a second time in the quarter when he ran to the right, cut back to the left and scampered in from 25 yards out with 1:51 remaining. Drew Taranto's second point-after-kick of the day made it 28-7 at the end of the half, which saw Rensselaer gain 327 yards of total offense, including 233 through the air. St. Lawrence had 116 yards, including 60 passing.

The Engineers increased its lead to 35-7 on a 1-yard run from Bernardo with 7:25 remaining in the third quarter, capping an 8-play, 66-yard drive. St. Lawrence found the end zone three minutes later when Bezio and O'Donnell hooked up from 24 yards out with 4:11 left. The extra point was missed, making the score 35-13. The Saints gained possession of the ball after recovering a fumble - one of seven in the game - on the Rensselaer 27-yard line.

In addition to his 186 yards rushing, Bernardo also had four receptions for 54 yards. Branche finished with ten catches for 98 yards while McGowan had seven for 58 yards. Robertson completed 25-of-43 passes for 268 yards and one interception.

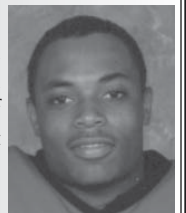
The third touchdown pass from Robertson to McGowan, this time from 48 yards out, and Taranto's extra point put RPI ahead 41-0 at 13:31 of the fourth quarter.

Robertson completed 24-of-33 passes for 267 yards, four touchdowns and an interception. He also ran eight times for 29 yards. McGowan caught 11 passes for 143 yards and three scores. As a team, the Engineers finished with 378 yards of total offense, including 267 through the air.

Defensively, RPI held the Mariners to 32 yards rushing and 91 yards passing in posting its first shutout since beating St. Lawrence, 55-0, on Nov. 8, 2003. Cochran led the way with six tackles, including five solos and one for a loss of three yards, an interception with a 12-yard return, a pass breakup and the fumble recovery for the touchdown.

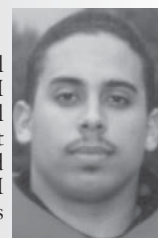
1999 NCAA First Round Game

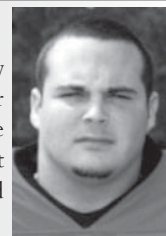

A member of the Class of '96, Patricia joined the Patriots in 2004 and spent his first season as an offensive coaching assistant. He was the team's assistant offensive line coach in 2005 – helping New England win the Super Bowl – before taking over the linebackers.

A former offensive lineman for the Engineers, Patricia graduated from Rensselaer in 1996 with a degree in aeronautical engineering.

Another former RPI assistant coach, Bob Surace, is also working the NFL sidelines. He is the assistant offensive line coach for the Cincinnati Bengals.



Harry Neugold is the only player in Rensselaer football history to be selected in the National Football League draft. Chosen by the Los Angeles Rams in the 17th round (219th pick overall) of the 1950 draft, Neugold played in three pre-season games but never in a regular season contest.

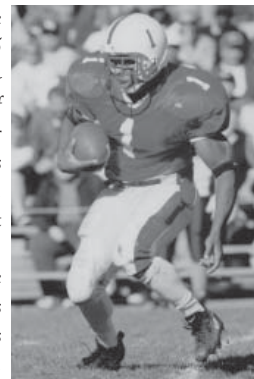

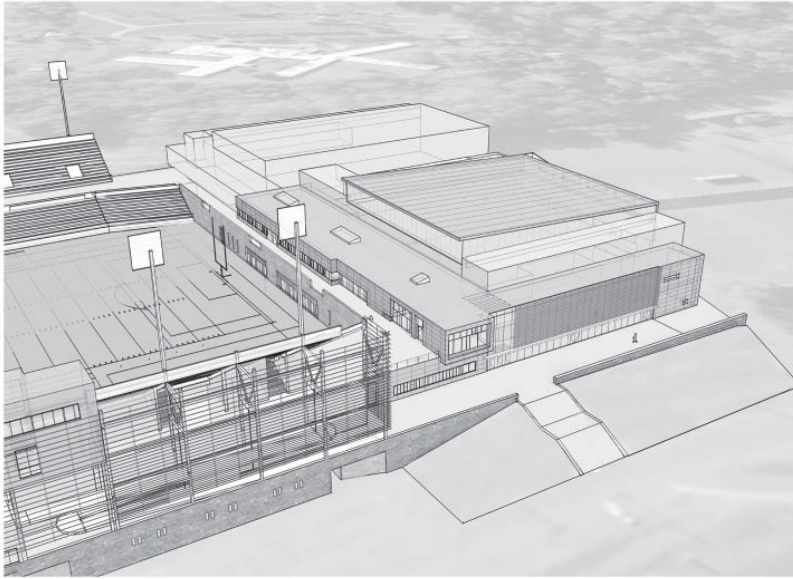

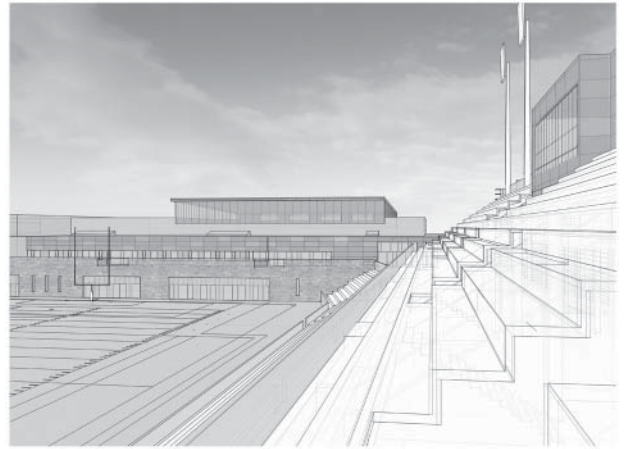


THE FACILITIES

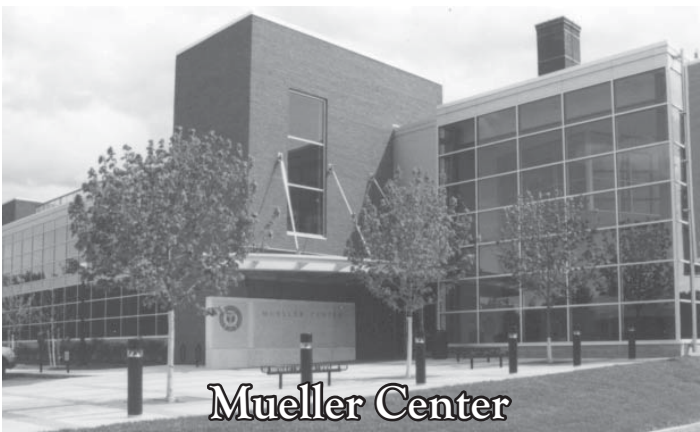
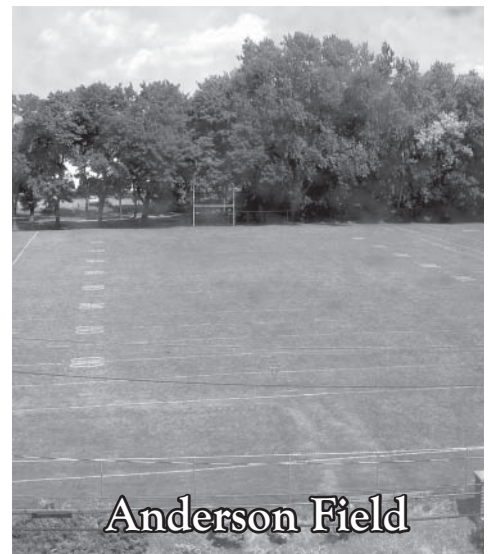
AERIAL VIEW LOOKING SOUTH

The Liberty League sponsors championships in 24 sports. The member institutions of the league place the highest priority on the overall quality of the educational experience and on the successful completion of its student-athletes' academic programs.

The member institutions seek to establish and maintain an environment in which a student-athlete's athletic activities are conducted as an integral part of the educational experience.

Originally founded as the Upstate Collegiate Athletic Association in 1995, the conference



was renamed the Liberty League (www.libertyleaguesports.org) during the summer of 2004. The current league includes founding members Clarkson University, Hamilton College, Hobart and William Smith Colleges, the University of Rochester, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, St. Lawrence University, Skidmore College and Union College. Vassar College became a full member during the 2000-01 academic year while the Coast Guard Academy, Kings Point and WPI joined in 2004-05 as members in football only. Susquehanna University replaces Coast Guard beginning in 2007.

"Our conference has evolved dramatically over the past 10 years and we felt the timing was appropriate for this change," League President and St. Lawrence Athletic Director Margaret Strait said upon the announcement of the new moniker. "The new name and logo project a positive image for institutions that have worked together to provide a very meaningful educational experience for thousands of student-athletes."
